- 1. Chairman Stokes gave opening remarks. Some remarks were:
 - o Talked about the importance of getting youth (young people) involved
 - o What better way to getting young people involved than through YouthWorks!
- 2. Director Perkins-Cohen along with several of his staff members presented a PowerPoint Presentation. A copy is on file. "YouthWorks is an investment in "Young Baltimoreans!"
- 3. The committee members asked questions, made comments, and etc. Some highlighted topics of discussion were:
 - The OED was asked to talk about some of their outreach efforts
 - **Ouestions:**
 - Who decided only \$4 million out of the \$30 million would be used for YouthWorks?
 - What is the remaining \$26 million to be used for? One answer was: "Must be affected by COVID in order to use funding
 - Where is the workforce expanding? Where are the opportunities for growth?
 - Can you talk more about your partnerships with industries?
 - Is any data available about where you see potential in job growth and how OED is reaching out to facilitate same? Requested by Councilman Cohen: Please submit data regarding job growth
 - What is the possibility of having some of our young folks working at the Port of Baltimore?
 - The Port of Baltimore is a massive industry for the city; an important industry that is growing and should be looked at for job opportunities!

 - o Additionally, does MOED have a long-term plan to ensure the sustainability of the YouthWorks Academy being funded through ARPA? What will be the application process for youth interested in participating in the YouthWorks Academy?
- What is MOED doing to address the digital divide and the ways it hinders youth employment?
- What health and safety precautions are MOED implementing to ensure that the YouthWorks program participants are working in a safe, healthy environment during this global pandemic?
- Do you know how many YouthWorks participants identify as foster youth or a youth experiencing homelessness?
 - O Does MOED assist these youth in obtaining housing or providing them rental assistance? Does MOED provide housing resources for individuals in other workforce development programs besides YouthWorks?
 - o What has MOED seen as the biggest barrier for employment for foster youth and youth experiencing homelessness?
- Youth that identify as LGBTQ are at a higher risk of experiencing homelessness, and these youth
 are also underrepresented in YouthWorks participation. What steps is MOED taking to engage
 these young people, specifically trans and nonbinary youth, in the YouthWorks Academy?
 - o How is MOED working with employers to ensure that youths are working in inclusive environments?
- What barriers to job acquisition and retention do job seekers most often report?
- Is there programming or considerations made for youth, have been, or have a guardian that is or has been criminal justice involved?
- Can MOED share its employment selection and matching process?
 - o Are assessments performed to determine interest, career, and education?
- Does the YouthWorks program ever have youth return after a summer? If so, how many?
- Does MOED collect data on how many of its job seekers are experiencing homelessness, or are experiencing an emergency housing need?
 - o If so, how have job seekers been impacted by COVID-19 and subsequent changes to the housing and rental market?
 - o What referrals and supports do Job Centers offer to people in emergency housing situations?
 - o How has MOED developed job training programs that are accessible for people that are experiencing homelessness or other housing crises?
