AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING

Study and Report – Oversight of the Baltimore City Fire Department 1 2 FOR the purpose of requiring that the Baltimore City Fire Department, in consultation with certain other agencies, submit a report to the Mayor and City Council evaluating the policies, 3 4 practices, and internal control systems of the Department and evaluating the potential 5 establishment of an office dedicated to compliance and investigations within the Fire 6 Department; and providing for a special effective date. 7 SECTION 1. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That: 8 (a) No later than 120 150 days from the enactment of this Ordinance, the Baltimore City Fire Department ("Department"), in consultation with the City Board of Fire 9 Commissioners ("Board"), the City Administrator or the Administrator's designee, 10 the Law Department, the Department of Finance, the Labor Commissioner, the Office 11 12 of the Inspector General, and the Office of Equity and Civil Rights shall submit a report, as fully described in subsection (b) of this Section, to the Mayor and City 13 Council setting forth a comprehensive evaluation of the cost and feasibility of 14 15 establishing a compliance and investigations office within the Department. (b) The report required by this section shall include: 16 17 (1) an analysis of the legal parameters regarding the authority that Board of Fire Commissioners has as an oversight body to investigate the conduct of the 18 19 Department as outlined in Article VII, § 51(c) of the Baltimore City Charter; 20 (2) (1) an assessment of the Board's capacity to conduct investigations and if 21 there is a need to equip it with support staff to carry out this duty; 22 (3) (2) an analysis of the current internal disciplinary process used by the 23 Department, including the who is responsible for conducting disciplinary investigations; who is responsible for conducting Equal Employment 24 25 Opportunity investigations; and an evaluation of the composition of the Department's disciplinary hearing boards; 26
