Major Issues Discussed			

- 1. Chairwoman McCray called the work session to order.
- 2. Dr. Dzirasa provided an update on the City's COVID-19 vaccination progress and the Health Department's continuing efforts to vaccinate residents (presentation in file).

- 3. Committee members asked the following questions:
  - a. Is there high demand for vaccination appointments for children aged 5 to 11? Yes, there has been an early rush and limited supply. The vaccinations given represent all that were available.
  - b. Could we expand the Convention Center hours beyond 8 AM to noon? The Convention Center is a State facility and may expand its hours, but that is not in the Health Department's control. The Health Department run facilities have variable hours around the City, with a focus on Friday and Saturday hours.
  - c. How effective are boosters at protecting people from infection and severe symptoms? Data shows that vaccine effectiveness decreases over time and boosters get it back to ~90 percent effectiveness.
  - d. How is the Health Department working with schools to get children between 5 and 11 vaccinated? The Health Department meets with City Schools leadership regularly, works with schools to identify the best sites to provide vaccines, and partners with schools to share information with parents.
  - e. How is the Health Department addressing hesitancy among parents to get their kids vaccinated? The Health Department shares information directly with parents and works with pediatricians and other parents as trusted ambassadors.
  - f. How is the Health Department countering disinformation? The Health Department responds to disinformation on social media quickly to counter its spread and influence. It also makes information available in communities through town halls and focus groups.
- 4. Chairwoman McCray explained that the Committee will likely meet again on the resolution in the coming months and recessed the work session.
