#### **Background**

On Thursday, December 16, 2021, the committee held a hearing and approximately seventy-five (75) people attended. Following are notes taken during the hearing.

#### Major Issues Discussed

- 1. Councilwoman Ramos, primary sponsor of the Resolution gave opening remarks. Some highlighted remarks/comments were:
  - o Talked about a recent study produced by the Fund for Educational Excellence
  - o Talked about why the Resolution was introduced; background associated with same
  - o Concern: The number of vacant properties in the city
  - o Goal is to keep our students safe and getting them to school on time
- 2. The representative from Baltimore City Public Schools gave a PowerPoint Presentation entitled, "From Front Door to Schoolhouse Door." A copy is in the bill file
- 3. The representative from the Maryland Department of Transportation gave a PowerPoint Presentation.

  A copy is in the bill file.
- 4. The representative from the <u>Fund for Educational Excellence</u> also showed a PowerPoint Presentation.
- 5. The representative for the MTA Police talked about how their officers operate, their duties, responsibilities and processes.
- 6. Approximately seven (7) people gave public testimony; (students, parents, grandparents, teachers, etc.) to share some of their concerns and experiences.
- 7. The committee/council members asked questions, made comments and etc. Some highlights of same were:
  - Comment/Concern:
    - With many of our school closing some students were relocated
      - Concern: Keeping areas in city clean and safe for students who walk to school. Is there any discussion about keeping the areas clean and safe?
    - Inspire Program:
      - Talked about this program and asked, "Are you thinking about using some of the ARPA funding to help?"
    - Comment
      - Is glad to see our young people using their voice!
    - Concern(s):
      - Students being sexual harassed and getting to school late as well
    - Question:
      - Is it true that that the Mass Transit Administration can't provide separate service for schools? Answer: Yes, it's true
    - Transit Buses/Bus Routes:
      - Data was distributed for which buses comes near schools! I believe the data is incorrect! How can it be corrected?
- 8. Councilwoman Ramos gave closing remarks and stated, "An efficient, effective and safe transit system is needed." Chairman Stokes thanked everyone for attending. Hearing recessed.

On Thursday, May 5, 2022, the committee will reconvene to vote on the Resolution.

## 1 A COUNCIL RESOLUTION concerning

FOR the purpose of inviting representatives from the Department of Transportation, Department of Health, Baltimore City Public Schools, Mayor's Office of Children and Family Success and Office of Equity and Civil Rights to discuss our children's commute to school.

**Informational Hearing – From Front Door to Schoolhouse Door** 

6 Recitals

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In Baltimore City Public Schools, approximately 29,000 students take MTA public transit to school. Nearly three out of every four middle and high school students in our district rely on buses, light rail, and subways regularly. MTA service is designed primarily with adult commuters in mind, not the 18% of ridership who are children on their way to learn.

As such, our students face challenging obstacles on their way to and from school buildings. Due to school choice, many young people take lengthy rides to schools that are far from their neighborhoods, leading to increases in tardiness and absences which affect their education. Students often avoid taking part in after-school extracurricular activities and employment because of safety concerns on their evening trips home in the dark, with 32% of students saying they do not feel safe on their way to and from school. Young women commonly experience sexual harassment during their trips.

The City Council would like to determine the safety of our students on their commutes to school, the equatability of public transit for our students, and the impact of public transit on student attendance, academic outcomes, extracurricular activities, and employment.

4	Equity and Civil Rights to discuss our children's commute to school.
