12 13 14 15	Members of the Baltimore City Council have concerns about the Baltimore Office of Promotion and the Arts regarding its board membership, the Film Office, and Artscape. The Baltimore City Council now requests that the Baltimore Office of Promotion and the Arts take the following actions:
16 17	1. Expand the membership of the Office's Board of Directors with a focus on reflecting the diversity of the artists living and working in the City.
18	2. Establish Mayoral appointments to the Office's Board of Directors.
19 20	3. Modernize the policies and procedures of the Film Office to make the City a viable cent for entertainment productions.
21 22 23 24	4. Review and report on Artscape's expansion to the Station North Arts District with attention paid to the expansion's impact on the neighborhoods of Bolton Hill and Mt. Vernon, the campuses of the Maryland Institute College of Art and the University of Baltimore, and the City's infrastructure investments in and around these same areas.
