In its 30 active years of service and outreach, Baltimore's CARE was recognized citywide and credited with much of the City's outspoken respect and praise for our spirited senior citizens. In 2011, however, after the most recent Director retired, CARE was merged with the Health Department (BCHD), divided into 5 separate services, and more recently granted the City's former status as Baltimore's Area Agency on Aging (AAA).

Thanks to our Health Department's diligence and our Mayor's courage, thousands of our lives have been spared, and the Commission on Aging has been likewise safely protected throughout the dominance of the Covid years. In the latter case, the Health Department has made it possible to begin renewing the City's praise and celebration of our elders and to focus on addressing the continuum of need and opportunity of the age-ing process itself.
