Major Issues Discussed

- 1. The agency and committee discussed the implementation delay of the Baltimore City municipal identification card program since its passage in 2016.
- 2. The need for a municipal ID program to address the concerns of community members who lack access to identification, affecting their access to essential services and benefits.
- 3. The integration of the municipal ID program with existing services and data systems, including partnerships with schools, state agencies, and more.
- 4. The potential benefits of the municipal ID program, such as providing access to housing, healthcare, financial services, and cultural activities, especially for vulnerable and marginalized populations.
- 5. Data Integration: The discussion focuses on the challenges related to data integration, particularly regarding government systems. The issue of data compliance and the need to consult with agencies to implement business rules are highlighted.
- 6. Data Storage and Deletion: Clarification on the data storage process, which involves verifying documents for ID card applications and deleting the data to prevent misuse.
- 7. Funding Source: Inquiry into the identified funding source for the ID card program, including initial planning dollars and future budget considerations.
- 8. Community Engagement: The need to engage with various communities, including domestic violence survivors, homeless populations, youth, and undocumented residents.
