2023 Recap


- Sustaining and institutionalizing the work: MONSE completed its Framing Year (FY23) and the agency is midway through its Securing Year (FY24)

MONSE's Organizational Structure Is Built Out Across All Lanes







GVRS Provides Crucial Services, Support, and Opportunities




Focused Enforcement is a Key Component of the GVRS Model

2023 YTD (1/1 – 12/11)




2023 vs 2022 Jan - July: SWD Saw a Decline in H/NFS, While WD Numbers Plateaued After A Large Drop in 2022



2024 Goals: Gun Violence Prevention

- Continue citywide scaling of the Group Violence Reduction Strategy (GVRS) and the integration of the Community Violence Intervention (CVI) ecosystem
- Launch School-Based Violence Intervention pilot in the 2024-2025 school year
- Strengthen relationships and connectivity across Hospital-Based Violence Intervention Programs
- Launch second biennial external Safe Streets Evaluation
- Host twelve Community Violence Intervention Listening Sessions

- The Victim Services team assists both primary and secondary victims including young people and families - with mental health services, case management, and support resources

2024 Goals: Victim Services


- Continue expansion of victim services citywide

Stabilization Start Date

Returning Citizens Behind The Wall (RCBTW) Initiative

- Funded by American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) dollars, this initiative provides training and paid employment for people preparing to return to their communities, along with wraparound supports before and upon their return
- Partnership with Maryland DPSCS, MONSE, MOED, and BCRP
- Goal to expand program to additional City agencies
- Connects individuals who are incarcerated and eligible for work release (up to 18 months prerelease) with \$15/hour employment with the Recreation and Parks department
- Provides participants with career training and counseling in financial management and conflict resolution, among other services
- 32 active participants following soft launch in Spring 2023
- 77 total participants since launching

2024 Goals: Community Engagement & Opportunity

- Scale SideStep Youth Diversion program citywide
- Continue to strengthen interagency coordination and community partnerships to effectively address public safety challenges including youth violence and auto theft
- Strengthen coordination of services with DJS for justiceinvolved youth
- Integrate trauma-informed approaches into neighborhood stabilization efforts
- Launch Safe Return Plans
- Launch Re-Entry Action Council
- Scale and enhance Neighborhood Policing Plans


PSAD Version 1 Link

•An updated Arrest Map



Due to challenges with BPD new case management data system implementation, publicly available crime data may be inaccurate (+- 5%) until the issue is resolved.

2024 Goals: Policy & Research

- Enhance 911 Diversion Efforts
- Assist in improving Public Safety Advisory Commission
- Fine-tune and scale IPV Stat and GVRS Stat
- Establish interagency Data-Sharing Agreements
- Update the Comprehensive Violence Prevention Plan (CVPP) as required by the Biennial Comprehensive Violence Prevention Plan Ordinance
