Dear Honorable President Mosby and Members of the City Council:

I am pleased to inform your Honorable Body that I have signed into law this day the following bills:

23-0366 – Zoning – Conditional Use of a Single-Family Dwelling Unit to 2 Dwelling Units in the R-8 Zoning District – 2001 Boone Street

For the purpose of permitting, subject to certain conditions, the conversion of a single-family dwelling unit to 2 dwelling units in the R-8 Zoning district on the property known as 2001 Boone Street (Block 4017, Lot 048), as outlined in red on the accompanying plat; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0372 - Office of CitiStat - Establishment and Administration

For the purpose of establishing the Office of CitiStat; defining certain terms; providing for the appointment and confirmation of the Director of the Office; establishing the power and duties of the Office; providing for a staff and budget for the Office; establishing a data-driven officer for each principal agency of the Office; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0386 – Landmark List - Home of the Friendless

For the purpose of designating the Home of the Friendless, 1313 Druid Hill Avenue, as an historical landmark: exterior; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0408 – Zoning – Conditional Use Conversion of a Single-Family Dwelling Unit to 2 Dwelling Units in the R-8 Zoning District – Variances – 1046 Brantley Avenue

For the purpose of permitting, subject to certain conditions, the conversion of a single-family dwelling unit to 2 dwelling units in the R-8 Zoning District on the property known as 1046 Brantley Avenue (Block 0115, Lot 071), as outlined in red on the accompanying plat; and granting variances from certain bulk regulations (lot area size), and off-street parking requirements; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0409 – Zoning – Conditional Use Conversion of a Single-Family Dwelling Unit to 3 Dwelling Units in the R-8 Zoning District – Variances – 2127 McCulloh Street

For the purpose of permitting, subject to certain conditions, the conversion of a single-family dwelling unit to 3 dwelling units in the R-8 Zoning District on the property known as 2127 McCulloh Street (Block 0310, Lot 013), as outlined in red on the accompanying plat; and granting variances from certain bulk regulations (lot area size); and providing for a special effective date.

23-0410 - Rezoning - 6311 Eastern Avenue

For the purpose of changing the zoning for the property known as 6311 Eastern Avenue (Block 6699, Lot 002A), as outlined in red on the accompanying plat, from the I-2 Zoning District to the C-2 Zoning District.

23-0425 – Improving Safety and Habitability in Supportive and Other Residential Housing

For the purpose of defining the term "supportive housing facility" in the Baltimore City Building Code; requiring a permit before any person may transfer ownership or operation of certain property in certain circumstances; updating use and occupancy classifications; and categorizing congregate living facilities as rental dwellings and requiring their licensing.

23-0429 - South Baltimore Gateway Community Impact District Management Authority - Board of Directors

For the purpose of altering certain membership requirements for the Board of Directors for the South Baltimore Gateway Community Impact District Management Authority; amending certain term limits for certain members of the Board of Directors; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0440 - Sale of Property - Market Center Renewal Plan Area - 32 Properties

For the purpose of authorizing the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to sell, at either public or private sale, all its interest in certain properties that are located within that area formerly known as the Market Center Renewal Plan Area, originally established by Ordinance 77-579, as last amended by Ordinance 18-214, and are no longer needed for public use; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0452 - Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation - M-R: Arts and Culture - \$581,334

For the purpose of providing a Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation in the amount of \$581,334 to M-R: Arts and Culture - Service 824 (Events: Art: Culture: and Film), to provide funding for general operations; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0457 - Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation - Board of Elections - \$1,300,000

For the purpose of providing a Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation in the amount of \$1,300,000 to the Board of Elections - Service 899 (Fair Conduct of Elections), to provide funding for balancing the Board of Elections budget for Fiscal Year 2023 due to costs associated with the 2022 Primary Election; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0458 – Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation – MR: Office of Cable and Communications – \$300,000

For the purpose of providing a Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation in the amount of \$300,000 to the MR: Office of Cable and Communications - Service 876 (Media Production), to provide funding for balancing the MR: Office of Cable and Communications budget for Fiscal Year 2023 due to costs associated with staffing the service; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0459 - Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation - Fire Department - \$18,900,000

For the purpose of providing a Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation in the amount of \$18,900,000 to the Fire Department - Service 609 (Emergency Medical Services), to provide funding for balancing the Fire Department budget for Fiscal Year 2023 due to costs associated with staff overtime payments and contractual services to provide Basic Life Service ambulance services; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0461 - Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation - Department of Law - \$1.900.000

For the purpose of providing a Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation in the amount of \$1,900,000 to the Department of Law - Service 860 (Administration-Law), to provide funding for balancing the Department of Law budget for Fiscal Year 2023 due legal fees and support services fees exceeding the adopted budget; and providing for a special effective date.

${\bf 23\text{-}0462-Supplementary\ General\ Fund\ Operating\ Appropriation-Liquor\ License\ Board-\$300,000}$

For the purpose of providing a Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation in the amount of \$300,000 to the Liquor License Board - Service 850 (Liquor Licensing), to provide funding for balancing the Liquor License Board budget for Fiscal Year 2023 due to costs associated with staff overtime payments; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0463 – Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation – MR: Office of Children and Family Success – \$400,000

For the purpose of providing a Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation in the amount of \$400,000 to the MR: Office of Children and Family Success - Service 109 (Administration-Children and Family Success), to provide funding for balancing the MR: Office of Children and Family Success budget for Fiscal Year 2023 due to costs associated with unplanned contractual staffing costs that were not fully offset by vacancy savings; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0464 – Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation – Department of Public Works – \$1,900,000

For the purpose of providing a Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation in the amount of \$1,900,000 to the Department of Public Works - Service 663 (Waste Removal and Recycling), to provide funding for balancing the Department of Public Works budget for Fiscal Year 2023 due to landfill tipping fees and vehicle rental fees exceeding the adopted budget; and providing for a special effective date.

INTRODUCTION AND READ FIRST TIME

The President laid before the City Council the following bills and Resolutions of the Mayor and City Council for first reading:

Bill No. 24-0481 – By the Council President (Administration – Department of Law)

An Ordinance increasing the City's authorization to issue revenue obligations within the maximum aggregate principal amount of the revenue obligations authorized and calculated, as of June 30 of each year, by the City to finance or refinance wastewater facilities and, in that connection, amending and restating Ordinance 02-332, as amended by Ordinances 07-421, 11-430, and 14-293; authorizing the Board of Finance to specify, prescribe, determine, provide for, approve, and amend the form, terms, provisions, manner or method of issuing and selling, the time or times of issuance, and all other details of the revenue obligations and any other matters necessary or desirable in connection with the authorization, issuance, sale, and payment of these revenue obligations; providing for a special effective date; and generally relating to the issuance and payment of revenue obligations.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

Bill No. 24-0482 – By the Council President (Administration – Ways and Means Committee)

An Ordinance increasing the City's authorization to issue revenue obligations within the maximum aggregate principal amount of the revenue obligations that may be outstanding authorized and calculated, as of June 30 of each year by the City to finance or refinance water facilities and, in that connection, amending and restating Ordinance 02-331, as amended by Ordinances 04-687, 07-420, 11-429, and 14-292; authorizing the Board of Finance to specify, prescribe, determine, provide for, approve, and amend the form, terms, provisions, manner or method of issuing and selling, the time or times of issuance, and all other details of the revenue obligations and any other matters necessary or desirable in connection with the authorization, issuance, sale, and payment of these revenue obligations; providing for a special effective date; and generally relating to the issuance and payment of revenue obligations.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

Bill No. 24-0483 – By the Council President (Administration – Department of Law)

An Ordinance increasing the maximum aggregate principal amount of the revenue obligations that may be outstanding, as of June 30 of each year, under Ordinance 18-174, as amended, by the City to finance or refinance stormwater facilities and, in that connection, amending and restating sections of Ordinance 18-174; providing for a special effective date; and generally relating to the issuance and payment of revenue obligations.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

Bill No. 24-0484 – By Councilmember Ramos, Stokes, Burnett, Conway, Cohen, Middleton, Bullock

An Ordinance authorizing certain nuisance property located in Baltimore City to be subject to a certain in rem foreclosure process; requiring certain procedures for an in rem foreclosure; requiring the City to take certain actions to compensate the interested parties in property that is acquired through an in rem foreclosure; specifying the circumstances under which an in rem foreclosure judgement may be reopened; making conforming changes; defining certain terms; and generally relating to in rem foreclosure of nuisance property in Baltimore City.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

Bill No. 24-0485 – By Councilmember Ramos

An Ordinance clarifying a definition under Article 13, Subtitle 6 "Opportunity to Purchase"; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

Bill No. 24-0209R – By Councilmember Middleton

A Resolution inviting representatives of the Baltimore City Department of Transportation, the Maryland Department of Transportation, the Department of Public Works, the Department of Housing and Community Development, the Parking Authority of Baltimore City, the Mayor's Office on Infrastructure Development, the Office of Equity and Civil Rights, the Baltimore City Public School System, Bikemore, community leaders, local business owners, and other interested parties to discuss: (1) the process of developing new bike infrastructure; (2) the rationale for investing in bike infrastructure and its relationship to larger public transit infrastructure needs and goals; (3) how to achieve greater neighborhood engagement from private citizens and business owners; and (4) strategic planning of new infrastructure for all communities, including updated funding models and consideration of public safety ramifications of existing and proposed infrastructure, before developing new bike infrastructure.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Rules and Legislative Oversight Committee.

The President laid before the City Council the following Council Resolutions for first reading:

Bill No. 24-0210R - By Councilmember Burnett

Introduced (Read and adopted)

Request for City and State Action – Establish a State-City Partnership Park at Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park

FOR the purpose of calling on all relevant City, State, and nonprofit partners to collaborate on the creation and management of a State-City partnership to enhance and maintain Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park.

Recitals

WHEREAS, the Baltimore City Council seeks to maximize recreational opportunities and support employment opportunities for Baltimore's citizens, while also attracting visitors and economic investment to historically under served areas of the City;

WHEREAS, exposure to nature and the outdoors is essential to a happy, healthy life, and access to high-quality urban parks for young people improves their physical health, performance in school, ability to concentrate, and creativity, while also improving their mental and physical health;

WHEREAS, Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park is a unique, nationally recognized asset, being both Baltimore's largest park and 1 of the largest forest parks in any northeastern city, with over 1,000 acres of mature forest, streams, diverse natural habitats, historic structures, and many miles of scenic trails;

WHEREAS, the City is challenged to provide adequate staffing, maintenance, and programming for Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park, leading to public safety concerns, lack of necessary maintenance, and a public reputation that results in sub-optimal use and enjoyment of the park;

WHEREAS, the current condition of Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park is in part the result of more than 100 years of disinvestment and racist policies affecting West Baltimore, and this proposal would repair a portion of that harm;

WHEREAS, Baltimore City is 1 of only 2 jurisdictions in the State of Maryland that lacks a State park, and thus misses out on the recreational and economic advantages that having such an entity confers;

WHEREAS, Maryland law provides for the establishment of a collaboratively-managed "State-City Partnership" park, which would marshal the strengths and resources of the State, City, and volunteer residents to advance public access to Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park, providing public health benefits, improved public safety, and conservation jobs for youth in Baltimore;

WHEREAS, the 2021 State Park Investment Commission Report, chaired by former Governor Parris Glendenning, recommended that "the Maryland Department of Natural Resources and the City of Baltimore should collaborate on improvements to Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park";

WHEREAS, the Great Maryland Outdoors Act of 2022 earmarked significant new State funding for the operation, maintenance, and capital improvements of State parks and for Baltimore City Recreation and Parks, and these funds are currently available, requiring no increase in taxes or fees.

Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, that the City Council calls on all relevant City, State, and nonprofit partners to collaborate on the creation and management of a State-City partnership to enhance and maintain Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Maryland Department of Natural Resources, the Baltimore City Department of Recreation and Parks, Friends of Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park, the Baltimore City Delegation to the Maryland General Assembly, and the Mayor's Legislative Liaison to the City Council.

Councilmember Burnett made a motion, which was duly seconded, that the Rules be suspended.
