



The Law Department has reviewed City Council Bill 18-0279 for form and legal sufficiency. The bill would allow the City to condemn and close the part of Dillon Street described in the bill, which it no longer needs. The bill expressly reserves the rights the Mayor and City Council has in the structures located under the street bed, including access rights.

Section (34) of Article II of the City Charter grants the Mayor and City Council the power to "construct, open, extend, widen, straighten or close streets, bridges, tunnels or approaches to them and other public ways of every kind within the bounds of the City." Section 116(b)(2) of Article VII of the City Charter requires the Department of Transportation to prepare all ordinances for the opening and closing of streets.

The Law Department approves the bill for form and legal sufficiency.

Railroad easterly 201.24 feet to the west side of South Macon Street, and more particularly described as follows:

Beginning for Parcel 1 at the point formed by the intersection of the west side of CSX Transportation Inc. Railroad and the south side of Dillon Street 70 feet wide the point of beginning being distant Northerly 292 feet, more or less, measured along the east side of CSX Transportation Inc. Railroad from the north side of O'Donnell Street varying in width; thence binding on the east side of Lehigh Street Northerly 70 feet to the north side of Dillon Street; thence binding on the north side of Dillon Street Easterly 201.24 feet to intersect the west side of South Macon Street Southerly 70 feet to the south side of Dillon Street; thence binding on the south side of Dillon Street Westerly 201.24 feet to the place of beginning.


