- 1. Chairman Conway called the hearing to order, introduced the committee members in attendance, and invited the sponsor to make opening remarks.
- 2. BPD began with a presentation about crime Stats in the city (presentation in bill file)
- 3. The floor was open to questions from the committee topics included:
  - a. Juvenile arrest not associated with a district
    - 1. BPD is centralizing arrest of juvenile's (check Record) Renyolds director of youth
  - b. Work on reporting of general metrics looking for a breakdown on city wide metrics.
    - i. CAD Proactivity has this been helping to a decline in crime? How do we know?
      - 1. This is an inclusive metric with a lot of elements including resource allocation. But as a whole having this proactivity is a positive, leading to tips, better community relations, and other positive metrics.
    - ii. Does proactivity go up as a result of high clearance rate with officers having more time?
  - c. What has been driving numbers down both in the city and nationally?
    - 1. Good police work, the reduction in volume has helped, organization changes with the breakup of CID and other elements of organization change. Tech & resources have made a big difference.
  - d. Numbers will moderate throughout the year but still showing significant progress.
    - 1. BPD clearance rate is still trending 5 points higher than last year and last year was the highest clearance rate in 25 years.

- 6. Questions from the committee
  - a. What is the strategy to combat these open-air markets?
    - i. BPD
      - 1. It is a comprehensive strategy with enforcement, economic development, other resources.
      - 2. Balancing act with other police responsibilities and so limited.
    - ii. MONSE
      - 1. So much prioritization has been on violence but MONSE has been looking at the intersection of violence with drug markets.
      - 2. Biweekly meetings with agencies

- iii. Admin
  - 1. No plan per se
  - 2. If we see someone selling we need to arrest
  - 3. Members need to engage with their command staff in their district
- b. Need a plan to be able to articulate how drug markets are addressed to residents\* follow up from executive team by March  $25^{th}$ 
  - i. Need to give people an understanding that this is a priority, and a knowledge that we are working on this.
- c. Coordination between different groups
  - i. SAO working with BPD on coordination constantly
  - ii. There is a system of triage for drug cases and looking at the appropriate use of resources.

- d. recent takedowns of open-air markets how are they prioritized?
  - i. Meeting with GVRS partners to review trends
    - 1. This generates outreach, engagement, and enforcement
    - 2. Problems exist when creating solutions at scale.
      - a. Westside shopping created relationships with some youths selling to divert them to a work opportunity.
- e. Narcotics arrest breakdown
  - 1. Charges are quantity-based for intent to distribute v personal use
  - 2. Additional factors like scales, or other materials can lend weight to decision to charge for selling
- f. On misdemeanor cases how do we move these diversion?
  - 1. Drug docket
  - 2. Circuit drug treatment court
  - ii. SAO is working to change the culture many SAO attorneys had not prosecuted drug cases before
    - 1. Organizational changes w/ build out to help relationship with BPD and help to coordinate prosecution of drugs.
- g. Questions about funding for MONSE & Community Organizations to make sure that this work can continue.
  - i. How can council partner with MONSE on these markets.
    - 1. GVRS is only in 4 districts but can use other tools like coordinate neighborhood stabilization
  - ii. How are these pritorized?
    - 1. Not based on drug corners
      - a. done post law enforcement takedowns
      - b. direct information from an organization, officials, other sources.
      - c. Data and analysis looks at several factors like crime & 911 calls also likelihood of retaliation and escalating violence.
  - iii. Who specifically makes decisions as to what is prioritized
    - 1. City wide initiatives (stabilizations)
      - a. Takedowns
      - b. Youth involved homicides
      - c. Police involved shootings
      - d. Mass shootings
      - e. Rapid escalating violence
    - 2. Weekly review of shootings
    - 3. Mayor, CAO
  - iv. Provide list of stragitic locations with # of violent incidents that precipided that over the last year or 3 years \* MONSE
- h. In the case where someone is selling drugs but not enough to charge how do we hold them accountable? Citations?
  - 1. BPD is just going to arrest someone who is selling drugs
  - 2. SAO has charges that are more nuanced
    - a. Cannabis is more complicated with legalization
    - b. Diversion
    - c. Services though none are offered via central booking
