1	A COUNCIL RESOLUTION concerning
2	Baltimore City Police – Return to Uniform
3	FOR the purpose of requesting the Police Commissioner to return plain clothes detective,
4 5	undercover, and other specialty squads to uniform dress code to increase law enforcement visibility and public awareness of police presence.
6	Recitals
7	In <i>The Psychological Influence of the Police Uniform</i> , an article published in the FBI Law
8 9	Enforcement Bulletin, March 2001, it states that the uniform of a police officer has been found to have a profound psychological impact on those who view it. The uniform of a police officer
10	conveys the power and authority of the person wearing it and is a powerful clue as to the
11	wearer's authority, capabilities, and status.
12	Research has revealed that the uniform has a subconscious psychological influence on
13	people, based on the person's preconceived feelings about police officers. When a person wears
14	the police uniform, citizens tend to be more cooperative with his or her requests, and people tend
15	to curb their illegal or deviant behavior when a police uniform is visible in the area.
16	Currently the Baltimore Police Department operates nearly 100 specialized units deploying
17	at least several hundred officers. These specialized units include the Flex Squad, the Special
18	Enforcement Unit, and the Organized Crime Unit and consist of officers exempted from regular
19	patrol duties to target specific areas of crime prevention.
20	Baltimore's continuing high homicide rate – 263 murders in 2005, not significantly less than
21	that of 269 in 2004 – is tangible evidence that a review of the Department's policy is necessary.
22	Deploying officers in specialized squads has not appreciably affected the number of people
23	dying on our City streets. Maybe it is time that the "thin Blue line" becomes visibly thicker.
24	Now, therefore, be it resolved by the City Council of Baltimore, That the
25	Baltimore Police Commissioner is requested to return plain clothes detective, undercover, and
26	other specialty squads to uniform dress code to increase law enforcement visibility and public
27	awareness of police presence.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Mayor, the

Police Commissioner, and the Mayor's Legislative Liaison to the City Council.
