For the purpose of the committee holding regular hearings with the Police Department, Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Safety and Engagement, and other agencies to monitor the progress of the City's crime reduction and violence prevention efforts.

BACKGROUND

In 2024, the City enacted <u>ordinance 24-325</u>, establishing an Office of Returning Citizens ("the Office") within the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Safety and Engagement ("MONSE") to serve as an advocate for returning citizens; coordinate service delivery to returning citizens, promote the general welfare for returning citizens; and, advise on city policy matters related to returning citizens. Within the Office, the ordinance also established a Re-Entry Action Council to advise the office on matters related to the Office's responsibilities. The ordinance also requires that the Office provide an annual report to the Mayor and City Council Detailing its activities and policy and legislative proposals to promote the welfare of returning citizens.

Before the enactment of ordinance 24-325, the Scott administration implemented the "<u>Returning Citizens Behind the Wall</u>" program to connect returning citizens with job opportunities and training; however, despite the program's initial ambitious goals of working with nearly 3,000 people, the program's initial cohort included only 22 individuals and intended to assist about 500 over fiscal years (FYs) 2024 and 2025. In FY 2025, the program set a target of assisting 33 individuals.

Outside of MONSE, the Mayor's Office of Employment Development also administers <u>workforce</u> <u>services</u> to assist returning citizens with their transition from incarceration to employment.

FISCAL NOTE

The total MONSE <u>budget projections</u> for FY 2025 and FY 2026 are significantly higher than the actual FY 2024 spend due to increased funding from federal, state, and special grant sources, and spending on expanded services. The service including the Returning Citizens Behind the Wall program has also seen an increase in its budget over the same period with the increasing spending primarily being allocated to contractual services.

The Mayor's Office of Employment Development Workforce Development service has seen a similar increase in its budget; however, its increasing spending has primarily been allocated towards salaries, rather than contractual services. In addition, each year the service has been consistently expanded to include more returning citizens.







Homicides by District








Non-fatal Shootings by District

Robberies by District







- 5 more classes planned for 2026


Cadets
