The Baltimore Police Department (BPD) has reviewed Council Bill 23-0427 for the purpose of adding the Baltimore Police Department to the growing list of city agencies required to designate 2 staff members to participate in trauma-informed care training and activities. The comfort and trust of a victim is crucial in piecing together and solving a crime, hopefully leading to justice for the victim and consequences for the perpetrator.

BPD is currently engaging in lesson plans and training sessions regarding evidence collection, response, and interview techniques after a sexual assault occurs or is reported. This bill will further our efforts in helping to provide victims with the care and resources most helpful in their time of need.
