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**A COUNCIL RESOLUTION CONCERNING**

**Peer-to-Peer Youth Enterprise Coordinating Group**

2 FOR the purpose of requesting the inclusion of a \$3 million line item in the 2008-2009 City  
3 budget for the Peer-to-Peer Youth Enterprises Investment Fund to expand the number of  
4 individual Peer-to-Peer Youth Enterprises in Baltimore City.

5 **WHEREAS**, According to Robert Balfanz, a researcher for the Center for the Social  
6 Organization of School at Johns Hopkins University, "failure to graduate from high school has  
7 become a ticket to the underclass." Between lower tax contributions and higher social programs  
8 use, each high school dropout can be expected to cost at least \$200,000 more in public funding  
9 over the course of his or her life than if he or she had earned a high school degree; and

10 **WHEREAS**, According to KidsCount Data book in 2007, 32.6% of middle school students  
11 and 42.6% of high school students are absent more than 20 days within the school year, and  
12 there is a direct correlation between attendance rates and drop out rates; and

13 **WHEREAS**, It is imperative that we implement new solutions for the crisis endangering our  
14 young people; and

15 **WHEREAS**, Peer-to-Peer Youth Enterprises hire young people to share skills and knowledge  
16 with other young people, with the paid peers entering the knowledge-based economy and  
17 positively affecting other young people; and

18 **WHEREAS**, Over 20 after school and out-of-school groups have Peer-to-Peer Youth  
19 Enterprises with very positive outcomes, with the paid peers having high graduation rates, high  
20 college enrollment, more involvement to improve their own communities, job skills and job  
21 readiness, and thus ultimately retaining youth leadership in Baltimore; and,

22 **WHEREAS**, The Peer-to-Peer Youth Enterprises has full support from Dr. Andres Alonso,  
23 CEO of Baltimore City Public Schools; and

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1       **WHEREAS**, The Peer-to-Peer Youth Enterprises Investment fund will leverage public dollars  
2 with private foundation and corporate dollars to create an on-going stream of funds for Peer-to-  
3 Peer Youth Enterprises citywide; and

4       **WHEREAS**, the City Council Education Committee fully supports Peer-to-Peer Youth  
5 Enterprises and the plans for an Investment Fund to expand the number of Peer-to-Peer Youth  
6 Enterprises citywide.

7       **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE**, That this  
8 Body requests the inclusion of a \$3 million line item in the 2008-2009 City budget for the Peer-  
9 to-Peer Youth Enterprises Investment Fund to expand the number of individual Peer-to-Peer  
10 Youth Enterprises in Baltimore City.

11       **AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Mayor, the  
12 CEO of the Baltimore City Public School System, members of the Board of Estimates, members  
13 of the Peer-to-Peer Youth Enterprise Coordinating Council, and the Mayor's Legislative Liaison  
14 to the Council.
