Major Issues Discussed

1. Baltimore's Behavioral Health System Capacity & Fragmentation:

- Growing behavioral health (BH) challenges including mental health, substance use, and opioid crisis.
- Fragmented and inconsistent experiences accessing BH services, especially crisis responses.
- Equity issues in access and service quality.

2. Behavioral Health System Baltimore (BHSB) Roles and Challenges:

- Overview of BHSB's function as the local behavioral health authority.
- Current crisis response system, including 988 hotline and mobile crisis teams.
- Funding gaps and workforce shortages affecting crisis response.
- Provider accountability and quality concerns.
- Data sharing limitations and lack of outcome-based metrics.

3. Oversight and Regulation of Treatment Providers:

- Concerns over "Any Willing Provider" statute enabling potentially harmful providers to operate.
- Lack of enforcement tools for local authorities to prevent low-quality or fraudulent providers.
- Discussion of the CARF accreditation process and its inadequacies for ensuring quality.
- Over-saturation of low-quality behavioral health and substance use providers in specific neighborhoods, particularly West Baltimore.

4. Behavioral Health System Data and Outcome Needs:

- Lack of clear outcomes data (e.g., treatment success rates, recidivism).
- Request for more transparency on provider quality and system performance.

5. Partnership and Legislative Advocacy:

- Need for enhanced city-council and BHSB collaboration for system improvements.
- Potential state-level legislative actions to strengthen oversight and accountability.

6. Community Engagement and Public Education:

- Promotion of 988 hotline and public awareness.
- Establishing community trust through better BH service delivery.
- Role of "988 Ambassadors" in educating communities about available BH resources.

- 4. Follow-Up on Crisis Stabilization Center Outcomes (Vice Chair Conway):
 - Requested data on post-discharge outcomes for clients of the stabilization center, including linkage to long-term care.
- 5. Multilingual Staffing and Language Access (Councilman Parker):
 - Request for data on how often translation services (e.g., Language Line) are used and which languages are most commonly requested.
 - Request for numbers and roles of currently employed bilingual staff, particularly within 988 call centers and mobile crisis teams.
 - Request for cost analysis and feasibility of hiring and training more bilingual employees to ensure language access is a consistent and structured part of crisis response.
