#### AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING

#### SECTION 1. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That:

- (a) The City Council would like to determine the root causes of student absences, both excused and unexcused, so as to develop policy recommendations that agencies can implement to address the most persistent barriers students face to attending school.
- (b) No later than 180 days after enactment of the Resolution, City Schools shall the Mayor and City Council request City Schools develop and submit to the City Council a report providing detailed data and analysis on traditional public school absences during School Year 2023-2024 ("SY23-24") 2024-2025 ("SY24-25") exploring the root causes of student absences both excused and unexcused, including: potentially including such factors as:
  - (1) reasons for absences;
  - (2) date of absences;
  - (3) economic class of absent students;
  - (4) parent involvement in absent students' education;

11 12	(c) The report shall further is requested to further include Baltimore City Schools' efforts to stem chronic absenteeism by:
13 14 15	(1) examining SY23-24 attendance data to understand the demographic, economic, and geographic distribution of absenteeism and determine patterns in excused and unexcused absences;
16 17 18	(2) identifying a sample of schools to perform data collection during the fall semester of 2024 SY24-25 based on the analysis of SY23-24 administrative data, including implementing a data collection plan with sample schools:
19 20	(3) meet with school attendance staff to assess and define challenges to addressing chronic absenteeism;
21 22	(4) attempt to make contact with families and students to gather information about the reasons for student absence;
23 24	(5) deploying a mixed method design to Fall 2024 data across a sample of schools to understand the most persistent root causes contributing to absences; and
25 26	(6) collecting qualitative data from school attendance leads, adults who have a relationship with chronically absent students, and families: families; and
27 28 29 30	(7) review the Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") between City Schools and the Maryland Transit Administration ("MTA") and provide recommendations to update the terms of the MOU to better address student needs.
31 32	(d) City Schools shall The City Council shall invite City Schools to present the report at a City Council Hearing.

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1	(e) (d) When developing the report, City Schools will collaborate with No later than 180
2	days after the hearing, the Baltimore Police Department, Mayor's Office of Children
3	and Family Success, Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Safety and Engagement,
4	Mayor's Office of Employment Development, Mayor's Office of Homeless Services.
5	Mayor's Office of African-American Male Engagement, Mayor's Office of Immigran
6	Affairs, Maryland Transit Administration, and the Office of the State's Attorney for
7	Baltimore City to will analyze the collected data report and collaborate with City
8	Schools to develop innovative solutions for how these agencies can support efforts to
9	address the root causes of unexcused absences.
10	(e) City Schools shall present the report at a City Council hearing.
11	(f) Prior to SY25-26 City schools and the MTA are requested to execute a new MOU
12	informed by the recommendations of this study, prior to SY25-26.
13	SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, That this Ordinance takes effect on the date it
	is enacted.
