## **Major Issues Discussed**

- 1. Chairman Conway called the hearing to order, introduced the committee members in attendance, and invited the sponsor to make opening remarks.
- 2. Chair Conway gave opening remarks
- 3. Commissioner Worley began a presentation from BPD (Slide Deck in Bill File)
  - a. Assistant Chief for juveniles spoke to updates on juvenile crime in city
  - b. AC Sara Ritter with update on Community policing
- 4. Director Mavronis gave a presentation from MONSE (Slide Deck in Bill File)
- 5. Questions from the Committee
  - a. Asking for an update on rape/sexual assault crimes asking how we can bring up the clearance rates
    - i. Steve Herman Lt. Col in charge of specialized investigations responded that clearance rates on this are nuanced there is some instances of clearing incidents and not always the offenses.
    - ii. There are instances where a case meets the probable cause standard but not beyond a reasonable doubt and so not prosecuted. Cases may also not be prosecuted for other reasons such as consideration of the survivors.
    - iii. Cleared by arrest v cleared by exception (i.e. suspect has died or fled the country)
  - b. Is there an issue where we can manage in these numbers?
    - i. BPD feels they are in a good place with the management of these cases
      - 1. Sex crimes have been consolidated under one command
      - 2. BPD have been working through the backlog of old cases
    - ii. Sex crimes are being addressed on daily crime calls
  - c. Robbery what trends are we seeing?
    - i. Restaurant crimes
      - ii. Youth crimes
        - 1. Investigations can be made more complex by difficulty in investigating minor suspects
        - 2. High incident times included 7-9am & 3-5 pm
        - 3. High incident locations included the Inner Harbor, Paterson Park, bus stops, & schools
        - 4. Youth are frequently released quickly this can also hurt investigations.
    - iii. City wide enforcement team is helping with rapid deployment of resources
      - 1. Goal to "bust patterns" in 10 or less instances
  - d. Increase in numbers of juvenile arrest
    - i. Teens arrested in a car jacked vehicles not always arrested for car jacking often arrested for stolen auto which is a nonviolent crime
    - ii. Teens have been arrested multiple times over.
    - iii. State changes will now allow for teens to be held for car theft
  - e. How small is the subset of people who get rearrested
  - f. GVRS Timeline moved to 2026

- i. Began in western district last big jump is into the southern district looking to be in fiscal year 26 primary consideration is in resources and making it sustainable.
- g. MONSE Staffing Sustainability
  - i. With transfer of 10 position to general fund & other sources there are 7 positions still on ARPA funding working with BBMR on staffing levels
  - ii. By FY 26 staff should be wholly represented in budget hoping to keep about 43 or so staff members.
  - iii. MONSE not looking to make significant cuts in response to the end of ARPA funding
