Dear Honorable President Mosby and Members of the City Council:

I am pleased to inform your Honorable Body that I have signed into law this day the following bills:

22-0250 – The Councilmember Mary Pat Clarke Opportunity to Purchase Act

For the purpose of repealing City Code, Article 13, Subtitle 6 {“Tenant’s Right of First Refusal”} as obsolete and replacing it with a subtitle establishing a tenant’s opportunity to purchase certain rental facilities; defining certain terms; establishing certain exemptions from the subtitle; providing for certain rules of interpretation; authorizing the Commissioner of the Department of Housing and Community Development to adopt rules and regulations to carry out the subtitle; requiring that a landlord provide a notice of offer of sale to certain persons on deciding to sell a rental facility; establishing certain procedures for landlords and tenants in instances where a party submits a statement of interest to purchase a rental facility; allowing for the landlord to require certain earnest money deposits; permitting the assignment of certain rights; prohibiting a waiver of certain rights absent agreed-on consideration; requiring certain disclosures if a rental facility is transferred to a party other than a tenant; requiring certain reports; providing for certain penalties; and generally relating to providing tenants with the opportunity to purchase certain rental facilities.

22-0286 – Sale of Property - South Side Boston Street, South West Corner, and South Newkirk Street (Block 6587, Lot 008A); and South Side Boston Street, South East Corner, and South Newkirk Street (Block 6587A, Lot 016)

For the purpose of authorizing the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to sell, at either public or private sale, all its interest in certain properties located at South Side Boston Street, South West Corner, and South Newkirk Street (Block 6587, Lot 008A) and South Side Boston Street, South East Corner, and South Newkirk Street (Block 6587A, Lot 016) and are no longer needed for public use; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0354 – Administrative Procedure Act – Revisions

For the purpose of clarifying the role of the City Administrator, the Department of Law, and the Department of Legislative Reference in reviewing proposed regulations prior to public notice and comment; revising certain provisions regarding the initial submission period for a proposed regulation; revising certain provisions regarding Agency noncompliance with the Administrative Procedure Act; providing for a special effective date; and generally relating to the role of the City Administrator, the Department of Law, and the Department of Legislative Reference in the review and approval of proposed regulations.

23-0365 – Rezoning - 601 through 621 East Biddle Street, 1101 through 1129 Forrest Street, 602 East Chase Street, and 1110 Nursery Place

For the purpose of changing the zoning for the properties known as 601, 603, 605, 607, 609, 611, 613, 615, 617, 619, and 621 East Biddle Street, 1101, 1103, 1105, 1107, 1109, 1111, 1113, 1115, 1117, 1119, 1121, 1123, 1125, 1127, and 1129 Forrest Street, 602 East Chase Street, and 1100 Nursery Place (Block 1168, Lots 15 through 42), as outlined in red on the accompanying plat, from the R-8 Zoning District to the C-1 Zoning District; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0374 – Sale of Property – 707 East 34th Street

For the purpose of authorizing the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to sell, at either public or private sale, all its interest in certain property that is located at 707 East 34th Street (Block 4053, Lot 076) and is no longer needed for public use; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0384 – Sale of Property - 14 - 18 Light Street (7 East Redwood Street)

For the purpose of authorizing the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to sell, at either public or private sale, all its interest in certain property that is located at 14 - 18 Light Street (Block 0660, Lots 0001 and 003A), also known as 7 East Redwood Street, and is no longer needed for public use; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0385 – Study and Report - Baltimore City Climate Resilience Authority

For the purpose of requiring the Director of Finance, the City Solicitor, the Director of Transportation, the Director of Public Works, the Director of Planning, and the Director of Sustainability to submit a report detailing how Baltimore City may establish a local climate resilience authority originally authorized by Chapter 236 of the Acts of 2020, now codified as Title 22 {"Resilience Infrastructure"} of the State Local Government Article.

23-0388 – Urban Renewal - Lauraville Business District - Amendment 1

For the purpose of amending the Urban Renewal Plan for the Lauraville Business District to extend the life of the Plan; waiving certain content and procedural requirements; making the provisions of this Ordinance severable; providing for the application of this Ordinance in conjunction with certain other ordinances; and providing for a special effective date.

23-0426 – Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation – M-R: Arts and Culture – \$581,334

For the purpose of providing a Supplementary General Fund Operating Appropriation in the amount of \$581,334 to M-R: Arts and Culture - Service 824 (Events: Art: Culture: and Film), to provide funding for general operations; and providing for a special effective date.

INTRODUCTION AND READ FIRST TIME

The President laid before the City Council the following bills and Resolutions of the Mayor and City Council for first reading:

Bill No. 23-0444 – By Councilmember Costello and President Mosby.

An Ordinance amending the provision dedicating for public park uses the portion of the City that lies along the north west and south shores of the Inner Harbor, south of Pratt Street to the water’s edge, east of Light Street to the water’s edge, and north of Key Highway to the water’s edge, from the World Trade Center around the shoreline of the Inner Harbor and including Rash Field to permit multifamily residential development and off-street parking within the dedicated boundaries of Inner Harbor Park; and submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of the City for adoption or rejection.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

Bill No. 23-0445 – By Councilmember Conway (Administration - Office of the Mayor) and President Mosby

An Ordinance establishing the objectives, powers, and duties of the Baltimore City Police Department; defining certain terms; creating the role of the Police Commissioner and establishing the Commissioner as the head of the Department; providing for the appointment and confirmation of the Commissioner; establishing the powers and duties of the Commissioner; establishing the powers and duties of police officers; providing for police officers' enjoyment of certain immunities and defenses; and submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of the City for adoption or rejection.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Committee of the Whole.

Bill No. 23-0446 – By Councilmember Costello and President Mosby

An Ordinance amending the description C-5-IH Inner Harbor Subdistrict; and amending the bulk and yard regulations for the Subdistrict.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

Bill No. 23-0447 – By Councilmember Ramos

An Ordinance designating 3110 Elm Avenue (Block 3504B, Lot 006), as an historical landmark: exterior.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

Bill No. 23-0448 – By Councilmember Costello and President Mosby

An Ordinance amending the Urban Renewal Plan for Inner Harbor Project I; amending the Development Area Controls for certain development areas; amending the Land Use and Proposed Zoning exhibits to the Plan; waiving certain content and procedural requirements, making the provisions of this Ordinance severable; providing the application of this Ordinance in conjunction with certain other ordinances; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

Bill No. 23-0449 – By Councilmember Conway (Administration – Office of the Mayor) and President Mosby

An Ordinance repealing Subtitle 16 of the Public Laws of Baltimore City; creating a new article in the Baltimore City Code designated “Police Department”; defining certain terms; requiring the promulgation of certain rules and regulations; requiring the Police Commissioner to maintain the records of the Department; requiring that the Department be composed of a certain percentage of civilian employees; establishing a procedure for redistricting police districts; providing for collective bargaining and negotiations relating to direct compensation of police officers; establishing certain provisions relating to the qualifications, appointment, promotion, and probation of police officers; permitting police officers to earn witness fees; providing for a special effective date; and generally relating to the Baltimore City Police Department.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Committee of the Whole.

**BILL NO. 23-0397 REPORTED FAVORABLY
AND ORDERED PRINTED FOR THIRD READING**

Councilmember Middleton, for the Economic and Community Development Committee, reported that the Committee has complied with §§ 10-304 and 10-305 of the Land Use Article of the Maryland Annotated Code and Article 32 § 5-508 of the Baltimore City Code and recommends the adoption of Bill No. 23-0397 favorably.

An Ordinance changing the zoning for the properties known as Western Side North Lehigh Street South West Corner Eager Street (Block 6182, Lot 007), and Western Side North Lehigh Street 52-7 Feet South of Eager Street (Block 6182, Lot 008), as outlined in red on the accompanying plat, from the R-4 Zoning District to the I-2 Zoning District; and providing for a special effective date.

Findings of Fact**City Council Bill No. 23-0397****Rezoning - Western Side North Lehigh Street South West Corner Eager
Street and Western Side North Lehigh Street 52-7 Feet South of Eager
Street**

Upon finding as follows with regard to:

(1) Population changes;

The small residential population of the Orangeville neighborhood has not seen a change in the approximately 200 people that live there between the 2010 and 2020 decennial censuses.

(2) The availability of public facilities;

The existing neighborhood is well-served by public facilities, and this is not anticipated to change. The existing infrastructure will support a wide range of potential redevelopment options.

(3) Present and future transportation patterns:

Redevelopment of this area will not negatively impact the transportation patterns of the surrounding area.

(4) Compatibility with existing and proposed development for the area;

These lots have been vacant for 75 years or longer and can be redeveloped for a variety of potential uses.

(5) The recommendations of the City agencies and officials, including the Baltimore City Planning Commission and the Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals;

For the above reasons, the Planning Department will recommend approval of the rezoning request to the Planning Commission.

(6) The proposed amendment’s relationship to and consistency with the City’s Comprehensive Master Plan;

There are no specific provisions of the Comprehensive Plan that addresses this particular proposal.

(7) Existing uses of property within the general area of the property in question;

These lots are located at a transitional area between residential and industrial uses and related zoning. There are industrial users adjacent to the south (also owned by the applicant) along the western side of East Lehigh Street. There are also homes on the eastern side of North Lehigh Street, though they are presently zoned 1-2 Industrial, and so are existing nonconforming uses.

- (8) The zoning classification of other property within the general area of the property in question;

The western side of this block is currently zoned R-4 residential, and borders on the eastern edge of the small residential area in the middle of the Orangeville neighborhood.

- (9) The suitability of the property in question for the uses permitted under its existing zoning classification;

These lots have been vacant for a long time, and are suitable for additional industrial development, and an expansion of the adjacent local business will be made possible.

- (10) The trend of development, if any, in the general area of the property in question, including changes, if any, that have taken place since the property in question was placed in its present classification;

The surrounding community has remained largely stable, with little overall development or other neighborhood changes in recent years.

- (11) For a rezoning based on a SUBSTANTIAL CHANGE IN THE CHARACTER OF THE NEIGHBORHOOD, the following facts establish the substantial change since the time of the last comprehensive rezoning;

- (12) For a rezoning based on a MISTAKE in the existing zoning classification, the following facts establish that at the time of the last comprehensive zoning the Council failed to consider then existing facts, or projects or trends which were reasonably foreseeable and/or that events occurring subsequent to the comprehensive zoning have proven that the Council's initial premises were incorrect;
