1 A COUNCIL RESOLUTION concerning

2 **Informational Hearing - HIV/AIDS State of Emergency**

3 FOR the purpose of calling on City, State, and federal agencies to update the Council about their
4 efforts to alleviate the AIDS pandemic in Baltimore and encouraging greater ongoing
5 collaboration between government at all levels and community partners working to address
6 the HIV/AIDS state of emergency in Baltimore City.

7 **Recitals**

8 The worldwide HIV/AIDS pandemic has a particularly severe impact on Baltimore City.
9 UNAIDS estimated that in 2007 there were 33 million people living with HIV/AIDS worldwide
10 and 2 million AIDS related deaths. 13,269 of these 33 million people lived in Baltimore. This
11 means that 1 in every 48 Baltimoreans is living with HIV or AIDS. In many neighborhoods the
12 percentage of people living with HIV/AIDS is greater than 4% of all residents. Although City
13 residents make up only 11% of Maryland's population, 47% of the State's HIV/AIDS cases are
14 found in Baltimore. The Baltimore-Towson metro area had the second highest AIDS case report
15 rate of any major metro area in the United States, and by some estimates every 8 hours another
16 Baltimorean is infected with HIV.

17 In recognition of the fact that the impacts of this pandemic touch the lives of far too many
18 City residents on a daily basis, Baltimore declared an ongoing HIV/AIDS state of emergency in
19 2002. In trying to cope with this state of emergency, the City has tasked the Commission on
20 HIV/AIDS with responsibility for monitoring and coordinating efforts to combat HIV/AIDS in
21 Baltimore. Many City, State, and federal agencies, as well as private organizations, make
22 significant contributions to these efforts. Some of the most active of the private organizations
23 engaged in the struggle against HIV/AIDS in Baltimore include:

15 As a new decade begins with the HIV/AIDS state of emergency still in effect, it is more
16 important than ever that the vital work of all of these organizations be supported and
17 coordinated. Accordingly, the City Council believes that an official discussion about the current
18 status of the struggle against HIV/AIDS in Baltimore is necessary at this time. This discussion
19 must involve all of the agencies and organizations that have a role in the fight against HIV/AIDS
20 so that additional and current recommendations from the Commission on HIV/AIDS and other
21 community stakeholders can be solicited. The extent to which progress has been made in
22 implementing the Commission’s previous recommendations and suggestions of how best to
23 move toward full implementation of those recommendations, must also be examined.

24 In order to re-emphasize the priority that the City Council places on efforts to alleviate this
25 pandemic, the Council therefore invites representatives of the many organizations engaged in the
26 struggle against HIV/AIDS to gather for a hearing before the Council in the hope that this
27 hearing will encourage an ongoing dialogue between government agencies and the HIV/AIDS
28 community. Such a dialogue is essential so that both the City and its community partners can
29 focus their efforts in the ways that will most effectively respond to the HIV/AIDS state of
30 emergency in Baltimore.

31 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE,** That City,
32 State, and federal agencies, as well as community organizations, are invited to appear before the
33 Council to describe their efforts to alleviate the AIDS pandemic in Baltimore and to discuss
34 ways to facilitate ongoing collaboration between government at all levels and community
35 partners working to address the HIV/AIDS state of emergency in Baltimore City.
