The Law Department has reviewed City Council Bill 15-0254R for form and legal sufficiency. This resolution expresses support for an expansion of the Law enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD) program nationwide and requests that law enforcement and other stakeholders appear before the City Council to discuss how the LEAD program could be implemented in Baltimore, what partnerships and structures need to be put in place to allow LEAD to succeed, and how to provide it with the necessary human and financial resources.
