Summer Learning 2025: Overview

 As expected, with the sunset of ESSER funds, summer 2025 learning programs have been strategically scaled back.

- Summer 2025 dates:
 - June 30 July 31*
 - 5 weeks (20 days)
 - Monday Thursday

A Look Back at ESSER-Funded Summer Programs*

Summer 2022 - \$24.6M

Summer 2023 - \$28.9M

Summer 2024 - \$20M

We anticipate spending ~\$8M for Summer 2025.

*Additional funds were used through IDEA to provide Extended School Year (ESY) Programs for any student with a disability who had ESY services listed on their IEP

Summer Learning 2025: Planning Considerations

Considered programmatic attendance, fiscal impact, student demographics to help determine which summer programs to prioritize

Aligned summer learning initiatives with state's PK- 3
Literacy Policy

Leveraged demographic data to optimize the placement of summer sites and ensure equitable access for students

Over 12,000 student seats available for Summer 2025! Over 20 district-led and 6 externally-led programs!



Credit Recovery Programs

- Multiple Sites & Options
 - 4 in person sites, 1 Virtual site
 - 7,400 seats offered
- Wide Range of Course Offerings
 - All core content courses required for graduation are available
 - English, Math, Science, Government, History, Health, Art, Music, World Languages



Credit Recovery programs are an out-of-school-time opportunity for students to retake a course in which they were not successful and did not earn the credit.


Extended School Year (ESY)

- Extended School Year services are the individualized extension of specific special education and related services that are provided to a student with a disability beyond the normal school year.
- Programs include: Early Learning, Traditional, Life Skills, PAL (Program for Autistic Learners), Vision, DHOH (Deaf Hard Of Hearing), PRIDE (Promoting Respect Integrity Discipline & Excellence)
- Summer Arts for Learning Academy (SALA) Expanded to 4 sites (25 classrooms)



YouthWorks Opportunities in City Schools

- Eight CTE Sites (Wind, BACH, Auto, Coast Guard, Carver House, BCFD, Southwest Professional Skills, Microsoft IRC)
- Multiple School-Based Sites (Principaldesignated support projects and/ or special initiatives, supporting summer programs)
- District Credit Recovery & AP Academy are YouthWorks sites where students will be paid for their participation



YouthWorks is a program within the Baltimore City Mayor's Office of Employment Development, Youth Services Division. We provide a 5-week job opportunity to thousands of Baltimore City young people between the ages of 14 to 21.

Summer Meals: Food & Nutrition

- USDA's Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) is available at all city schools* with 15 or more program participants. All sites are **open sites which means that** meals are available to all youth, even those not participating in the summer program.
- In Summer 2024, 118 schools offered summer meal programs 46% of those programs were school-based programs (54% were planned at the district level). For Summer 2025, applications have been submitted for 99 schools as of April 28. Deadline for sign up is Tuesday, May 20.
- MD DHS will continue to offer Sunbucks/Summer EBT ** in 2025. While schools are closed, families will receive \$40 per month in federally-funded grocery benefits on an Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) card to purchase food for each school-age child who is eligible for free or reduced-price school meals.
