Dear Honorable President Mosby and Members of the City Council:

I am pleased to inform your Honorable Body that I have signed into law this day the following bills:

**22-0254 – Office of Aging – Independent Agency**

For the purpose of establishing an Office of Aging as an independent agency; defining certain terms; providing for the appointment of the Director of the Office; establishing duties of the Office; providing for the staff and budget of the Office; requiring the adoption of certain rules and regulations; requiring the Office to submit an annual report to the Mayor and City Council; establishing the Commission on Aging to advise and collaborate with the Office; providing for the appointment, structure, and governance of the Commission; requiring the Commission to submit an annual report to the Director; and requiring Commission members, the Director, and other staff of the Office to file financial disclosures under the Ethics Code.

**22-0287 – Real Estate Practices - Disclosures – Historic Districts**

For the purpose of requiring certain disclosures in order to sell a property that is located in a historic district; and providing for certain penalties.

**22-0323 – Zoning – Conditional Use Parking Lot – 3618 and 3620 Elm Avenue**

For the purpose of permitting, subject to certain conditions, the establishment, maintenance, and operation of an open off-street parking area on the properties known as 3618 Elm Avenue (Block 3538, Lot 038) and 3620 Elm Avenue (Block 3538, Lot 037), as outlined in red on the accompanying plat; and providing for a special effective date.

**23-0346 – RPP Area 48 (Riverside) – Revisions**

For the purpose of modifying the hours of applicable parking restrictions for Residential Parking Plan Area 48 (Riverside); reducing the non-permit parking time threshold; establishing an exception to the applicable permit limit; and correcting and conforming related provisions.

**23-0370 – Zoning – Use Regulation – Residential-Care Facilities (Age-Restricted)**

For the purpose of permitting certain residential-care facilities in the EC-2 Zoning District as a conditional use requiring approval by Ordinance of the Mayor and City Council; and providing for a special effective date.

**23-0371 – Zoning – Conditional Use – Residential-Care Facility (Age-Restricted) – 201 Homeland Avenue and a Portion of Block 5027, Lot 003**

For the purpose of permitting, subject to certain conditions, the establishment, maintenance, and operation of a residential-care facility (age-restricted) with 171 units on the property known as 201 Homeland Avenue (Block 5027, Lot 005) and a portion of Block 5027, Lot 003, as outlined in red on the accompanying plat; providing for a certain contingency; providing for a special effective date.

**23-0412 – City Property – Renaming Playground at Hanlon Park After Ruby K. Couch**

For the purpose of changing the name of the playground Hanlon Park, located at 2731 North Longwood Street, to the Ruby K. Couch Playground.

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**INTRODUCTION AND READ FIRST TIME**

The President laid before the City Council the following bills and Resolutions of the Mayor and City Council for first reading:

**Bill No. 23-0341 – By Councilmember Middleton, Ramos**

An Ordinance creating the Retail: Small Box Discount Establishment as a conditional use; establishing certain use standards for Retail: Small Box Discount Establishments; requiring

approval of a Retail: Small Box Discount Establishment as a conditional use in certain commercial zoning districts by the Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals; and generally relating to Retail: Small Box Discount Establishments.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

**Bill No. 23-0432** – By Councilmember Ramos

An Ordinance changing the zoning for the properties known as 3301, 3311, 3313, 3315, 3317, 3319, 3321, 3323, and 3327 Saint Paul Street (Block 3871, Lots 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10), as outlined in red on the accompanying plat, from the R-8 Zoning District to the C-1 Zoning District.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

**Bill No. 23-0433** – By Councilmember Ramos

An Ordinance approving certain amendments to the Development Plan of the North Charles Village Planned Unit Development.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

**Bill No. 23-0434** – By Councilmember Ramos

An Ordinance repealing the existing Development Plan for the North Charles Village Planned Unit Development; approving a new Development Plan for the North Charles Village Planned Unit Development; establishing prohibited uses within the Planned Unit Development; providing for the creation of the North Charles Village Planned Unit Development Design Review Committee; establishing the membership of the Committee; establishing applicable design guidelines for the Planned Unit Development; requiring the Committee to review proposed developments and amendments to the development plan; providing for a special effective date; and generally relating to the North Charles Village Planned Unit Development.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

**Bill No. 23-0435** – By Councilmember Schleifer

An Ordinance amending provisions of the Baltimore City Zoning Code relating to variances to conform to relevant State law; making modifications to the process of granting variances; clarifying provisions of the Zoning Code relating to nonconforming structures; providing for a

special effective date; and generally relating to the zoning and land-use laws of the City of Baltimore.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

**Bill No. 23-0436** – By Councilmember Porter

An Ordinance repealing the existing Brooklyn-Curtis Bay Urban Renewal Plan and replacing it by designating as a “Renewal Area” an area situated in Baltimore City, Maryland known as Brooklyn-Curtis Bay, generally including both sides of Patapsco Avenue between the Harbor Tunnel Throughway and Pennington Avenue, both sides of Pennington Avenue between Patapsco Avenue and Ceddox Street, the west side of Curtis Avenue between Ceddox Street and Patapsco Avenue, both sides South Hanover Street between Jack Street and Chesapeake Avenue, and the south side of Potee Street between Patapsco Avenue and Frankfurst Avenue; establishing the objectives of the Urban Renewal Plan; establishing permitted land uses in the Renewal Area; providing that where there might be conflict between the provisions of the Urban Renewal Plan and the provisions of any Planned Unit Development, the provisions of the Planned Unit Development control; providing review requirements and controls for all plans for new construction; providing that the provisions of the Baltimore City Zoning Code apply to the properties in the Urban Renewal Area; establishing controls for off-street parking facilities; authorizing the conditions for acquisition of properties in the Urban Renewal Area; providing for review by the Department of Housing and Community Development of development or rehabilitation plans in the Urban Renewal Area with respect to their conformance with the provisions of the Urban Renewal Plan; providing for community notification of any permit application for the development or redevelopment of any property within the boundaries of the Urban Renewal Area; creating disposition lots and providing for specific controls on specific lots; providing for the term of the Urban Renewal Plan; providing for community review of all proposed amendments to the Urban Renewal Plan; making provisions of this Ordinance severable; approving appendices and exhibits to the Urban Renewal Plan; waiving certain content and procedural requirements; providing for the application of the Ordinance in conjunction with certain other ordinances; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

**Bill No. 23-0437** – By Councilmember Costello

An Ordinance permitting, subject to certain conditions, the conversion of a single-family dwelling unit to 3 dwelling units in the R-8 Zoning District on the property known as 1600 South Charles Street (Block 1013, Lot 065), as outlined in red on the accompanying plat.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

**Bill No. 23-0192R** – By Councilmember Bullock

A Resolution providing the required approval under Md. Code Ann., Alc. Bev. § 12-902.1(d)(1) to allow the license holder holding a valid Class B-D-7 Beer, Wine, and Liquor License issued for use at 1000 W Lombard Street, Baltimore, Maryland 21223 to apply to the Board of Liquor License Commissioners for Baltimore City to exchange their Class B-D-7 Beer, Wine, and Liquor License for a Class A-7 Beer, Wine, and Liquor License.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

Bill No. 23-0193R - By Councilmember Cohen, McCray

**Request for Federal Action – Permanent Broadband Subsidy  
to Support Low-Income Communities**

FOR the purpose of calling upon President Joseph Biden and the United States Congress to create a Congressionally-funded broadband subsidy, as well as broadband adoption and learning solution, as a permanent component of the federal benefits available to those experiencing digital inequity.

**Recitals**

**WHEREAS**, because of the vital nature of broadband in today’s society, the African American Mayors Association urged Congress in its resolution, “Bridge the Digital Divide-19 by Implementing an Emergency Broadband Benefit”, to include an emergency broadband benefit for low-income Americans, and called for a permanent broadband internet subsidy for low-income Americans funded through federal appropriations.

**WHEREAS**, the Baltimore Digital Equity Coalition was founded to close the digital divide in 2020 during the Covid-19 Pandemic and called for the creation of the Baltimore City Office of Broadband and Digital Equity.

**WHEREAS**, the federal Consolidated appropriations Act of 2021 established an Emergency Broadband Benefit Program (“EBB”), enacted on May 12, 2021, that served as a temporary subsidy on monthly broadband services for qualifying low-income households to ensure they could afford broadband connections needed for work, school, healthcare, and other uses.

**WHEREAS**, Congress modified and extended the EBB Program and renamed it the Affordable Connectivity Program (“ACP”) within the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act to make broadband service and connected devices available to low-income households at affordable, discounted prices from providers that opt to participate in the program.

**WHEREAS**, the Baltimore City Office of Broadband and Digital Equity has established the BMore Connected Campaign in partnership with EducationSuperHighway and Wide Angle Youth Media with the support of Comcast to promote the ACP.

**WHEREAS**, the ACP benefit provides a subsidy of up to \$30 per month toward internet service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands, and eligible households can also receive a one-time subsidy of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers, if they contribute more than \$10 and less than \$50 toward the purchase price.

**WHEREAS**, qualifying households for the ACP benefit are at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines, or include a member of the household that meets at least 1 of the following criteria: received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year; meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider’s existing low-income internet program; participates in identified assistance programs (i.e., SNAP, Medicaid, Federal Public Housing Assistance, Supplemental Security Income, WIC, Veterans Pension or Survivor Benefits, or Lifeline); or participates in a qualifying assistance program and lives on Qualifying Tribal Land (i.e., Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance, Tribal TANF, Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations, and income based Tribal Head Start).

**WHEREAS**, Congress approved \$14 billion for this program which became effective on March 16, 2022, and as of January 4, 2023, over 14.6 million households have signed up to-date.

**WHEREAS**, the Federal Communications Commission (“FCC”) adopted final rules for this long-term program, and it has been projected that the ACP will run out of funds in 2024, which would be highly disruptive to the over 14 million households receiving ACP-supported broadband service and could cause those households to lose broadband service.

**WHEREAS**, the FCC has recently moved to enhance broadband benefit awareness and enrollment, especially through efforts that support trusted messengers like digital navigators, community-based organizations, and government partners..

**WHEREAS**, broadband is critical for low-income communities to live, work, and play in the digital economy and it is imperative that these communities continue to have access to broadband.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE**, that the City Council calls upon President Joseph Biden and the United States Congress to create a Congressionally-funded broadband subsidy, as well as broadband adoption and learning solution, as a permanent component of the federal benefits available to those experiencing digital inequity.

**AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the President of the United States, the Vice President of the United States, the Maryland Congressional Delegation to the United States Congress, the Chair and Commissioners of the Federal Communications Commission, and the Mayor’s Legislative Liaison to the City Council.

**Baltimore Regional  
Water Governance Task Force**

FOR the purpose of urging the Baltimore Regional Water Governance Task Force to include the City Council in the Task Force’s deliberations and to consider stormwater management, equity, and fair representation for Baltimore City on the Board of any potential new governance structure.

The Baltimore Regional Water Governance Task Force (“Task Force”) was created by Senate Bill 880/House Bill 843 of the 2023 Maryland General Assembly. The purpose of the Task Force is to review the relationship between Baltimore City and Baltimore County and other nearby counties relative to water and sewer services and operations.



On September 27th, 2023, the Public Safety and Government Operations Committee held a hearing on City Council Bill 23-0182R, Informational Hearing - Baltimore Regional Water Governance Task Force. This resolution calls for an oversight hearing to understand the work of the Baltimore Regional Water Task Force.

During that hearing, it was clear that the work of the Task Force does not include 4 very important considerations. The Baltimore City Council is calling on the Baltimore Regional Water Governance Task Force to include these items in their deliberations and recommendations:

- **Stormwater:** Any conversation regarding regional water must include stormwater management and planning. Baltimore City has experienced monumental rain storms in recent years, and is planning significant infrastructure projects to mitigate the impacts of flooding. While the analysis to establish the right solution to the flooding includes all water coming into the area, these projects will not be successful if there isn't a regional approach to planning and management of stormwater at a regional level. Legal boundaries between counties have no bearing on stormwater flow. Stormwater from Baltimore County inevitably flows into Baltimore City and has devastating impacts in our neighborhoods, causing floods, sewer overflows, and sewage leaks in the basements of homeowners. A regional approach to stormwater is the most effective way to address this growing problem.
- **Equity:** Equity should be the center of the deliberations and conversation about water systems and delivery. Baltimore residents pay more than Baltimore County residents for the right to have clean drinking water delivered efficiently to their homes. Conversations about leadership of the new structure, water delivery, rates, and service options must include ensuring that our majority Black and increasingly diverse community are not disproportionately bearing the fiscal burden of our aging water system. All consumers must pay their fair share while allowing for affordability programs for those who need them.
- **Majority Baltimore City votes:** If a new regional governance structure is established, Baltimore City must have the majority of votes on the Board. The water and wastewater system is Baltimore City's asset and most of the customers of the system are Baltimore City residents. It is only fair that Baltimore City residents make up the majority of the Board.
- **Involvement of City Council:** The Baltimore City Council has concerns about the lack of engagement with elected officials in Baltimore City. If Baltimore City is being asked to approve a new system, elected officials should be included in the deliberations and decision-making related to the recommendations. The Baltimore City Council urges the Baltimore Regional Water Governance Task Force to engage the public and this body in its discussions and deliberations.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE,** That the Baltimore City Council urges the Baltimore Regional Water Governance Task Force to include the City Council in the Task Force's deliberations and to consider stormwater management, equity, and fair representation for Baltimore City on the Board of any potential new governance structure.

**AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Baltimore Regional Water Governance Task Force and the Mayor's Legislative liaison to the City Council.

Councilmember Ramos made a motion, which was duly seconded, that the Rules be suspended.
