Summary of Achievements:

- Significantly strengthened the operations and role of the Administration for Native Americans resulting in the largest budget, largest staffing, and increased presence in the history of the organization at that time, including the creation of the new Deputy Assistant Secretary for Native Americans position at the Administration for Children and Families (ACF), Department of Health and Human Services (HHS).
- Initiated and drafted the first Memorandum of Agreement for the Administration for Native Americans (HHS), Bureau
 of Indian Education (DOI), and the White House Initiative on Indian Education (DOEd) to continue the promotion of
 Native languages in schools and held the first joint Native Language Symposium for Native language grantees across
 the country to share best practices and assess the challenges and barriers.
- Partnered with the White House and the US Department of Agriculture to host a series of White House Generation
 Indigenous (GEN-I) Youth Summits, including the "kick off" White House Youth Leadership Summit, resulting in a
 report that highlights the priorities of GEN-I based on the feedback of the listening sessions held at each location.
- Successfully testified numerous times before the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs and the House Natural Resources
 Indian, Insular, and Alaska Native Affairs subcommittee on behalf of the Administration for Children and Families on
 the topics of economic development, Native languages and education, children and youth issues, and complex trauma
 in Indian Country.
- Facilitated the drafting and implementation of the first Tribal Consultation Policy for the Administration for Children
 and Families (ACF), Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) resulting in strengthened and increased
 communications between tribal governments and ACF programs and instituting the policy and practice of annual
 consultation sessions at ACF.
- Chaired the Intradepartmental Council for Native American Affairs for HHS which has led the effort to increase the
 accessibility of HHS grants, develop related training and technical assistance, review eligibility requirements and
 authorities of all grant programs, and research the expansion of self- governance within HHS for tribal governments.
- Successfully advocated within the Department of Health and Human Services, ACF to expand P.L. 102-477 to include LIHEAP funding and stronger collaboration with DOI, and the Tribal Advisory on reporting mechanisms. Facilitated several meetings among the ACF principals to gain better understanding about the benefits of the 477 program and tribal self-determination and to resolve outstanding differences regarding the 477 Program.
- Successfully advocated for the enactment of the Esther Martinez Native American Languages Act of 2006, resulting in increased funding for Native American language and immersion programs at HHS.
- Facilitated a series of field hearings/listening sessions resulting in legislative amendments to the No Child Left Behind Act, which were subsequently included in Every Student Succeeds Act of 2016.
- Worked collaboratively with organizations, such as the NAACP, Leadership Council on Civil Rights, National Council
 of La Raza, National Urban League, Southeastern Asia Resource Action Center, Alliance for Excellent Education, and
 the Mexican American Legal Defense Fund to work on policies around high school graduation rates and college and
 work preparedness.
