For the purpose of reconstituting the laws governing animals and their control and protection; prohibiting certain conduct; requiring licenses or permits for certain animals; providing for the licensing and regulation of certain animal facilities; prohibiting the keeping of certain animals; establishing standards for the general care and control of animals; establishing standards for the protection of animals from cruelty, abuse, and other inappropriate conduct; providing for the treatment of animals at large, dangerous animals, and vicious dogs; providing for the administration of complaints; providing for the appointment of animal control officers and for the enforcement of these laws by police officers, animal control officers, humane officers, and other authorized persons; abolishing the Vicious Dog Hearing Board and substituting for it a new Animal Hearing Board with broadened jurisdiction; authorizing the adoption of rules and regulations to supplement the law; defining certain terms; changing the name of the Bureau of Animal Control to Office of Animal Control; imposing certain civil and criminal penalties; conforming certain related provisions; and generally relating to the control and protection of animals.

3	(II) SECURELY MUZZLED AND LEASHED; OR

6	(d) Other Requirements.
7 8	An owner or custodian of an animal found to be a dangerous animal must:

11 12	(2) DISPLAY A "DANGEROUS ANIMAL" SIGN, VISIBLE TO THE PUBLIC, ON THE PROPERTY WHERE THE ANIMAL IS KEPT;
13 14	(3) IF THE ANIMAL IS KEPT OUTSIDE OF THE DWELLING, INSTALL A PERIMETER FENCE ON THE PROPERTY OR A PORTION OF THE PROPERTY;
15 16 17	(4) NOTIFY THE OFFICE IF THE ANIMAL IS LOOSE, HAS BITTEN ANOTHER DOMESTICATED ANIMAL OR HUMAN BEING, OR HAS VIOLATED ANY OTHER REQUIREMENTS OF THIS TITLE;
18 19	(5) NOTIFY THE OFFICE IF THE ANIMAL HAS DIED OR IS BEING RELOCATED TO ANOTHER JURISDICTION; AND
20 21	(6) BEFORE TRANSFERRING OWNERSHIP OR CUSTODY OF THE DANGEROUS ANIMAL TO ANOTHER:

9	(9) THAT IS A PUBLIC NUISANCE ANIMAL;
10	(10) whose owner or custodian is in violation of this title; or
11 12 13	(11) whose owner or custodian is in violation of any other animal control or protection law, rule, or regulation of this City or State.
14	§ 10-802. RIGHT OF ENTRY AND IMPOUNDMENT.
15	(A) In general.
16 17 18 19 20	On the determination that an animal should be impounded, an animal enforcement officer, police officer, humane officer, or other person authorized and contracting with the City to do so may enter onto public or private property, remove the animal, and impound it at an animal shelter or other facility approved by the Commissioner.
21	(B) FACILITY TO NOTIFY OFFICE.
22 23 24	If an animal is impounded, the owner or operator of the facility must immediately notify the Office of the impoundment and provide any information that the Office reasonably requires.
25	§ 10-803. Notice.
26	(a) Notice required.
27 28 29	When an animal is impounded, the Office must make a reasonable attempt to provide notice of the impoundment to the animal's owner of custodian.
30	(B) Contents of notice.
31	The notice must include:

1	(1) THE NAME, IF KNOWN, OF THE OWNER OR CUSTODIAN;
2	(2) A DESCRIPTION OF THE ANIMAL SEIZED;
3 4	(3) THE VIOLATION OF THIS TITLE, INCLUDING A REFERENCE TO THE SPECIFIC LEGAL AUTHORITY FOR THE IMPOUNDMENT;
5	(4) THE MANNER AND TIME IN WHICH THE PERSON MUST EITHER:
6	(I) RECLAIM THE ANIMAL; OR
7	(II) REQUEST A HEARING ON THE VIOLATION;
8	(5) A CONTACT PERSON AND TELEPHONE NUMBER AT THE OFFICE; AND
9 10 11	(6) A STATEMENT THAT IF THE OWNER OR CUSTODIAN FAILS TO ACT WITHIN 72 HOURS OF THE IMPOUNDMENT, THE ANIMAL WILL BECOME THE PROPERTY OF THE CITY.
12	(c) Unknown owner or custodian.
13 14 15	If the Office cannot ascertain the identity and address of the owner or custodian, the animal is considered abandoned and becomes property of the City after 72 hours from the impoundment.
16	§ 10-804. Holding period; Hearing.

14	§ 10-806. Unclaimed or surrendered animals.
15	(a) Unclaimed animals.
16 17 18	If an impounded animal is not reclaimed within 72 hours of impoundment, the animal is abandoned and immediately becomes property of the City.
19	(b) Surrendered animal.
20 21	If an animal is surrendered to the Office by its owner, the animal immediately becomes property of the City.
22	(c) Disposition.
23 24	Once an animal becomes City property under this section, the Office must:
25	(1) PLACE THE ANIMAL FOR ADOPTION;
26	(2) HUMANELY EUTHANIZE THE ANIMAL; OR
27 28	(3) TRANSFER THE ANIMAL BY ANY METHOD THAT IS ADVANTAGEOUS TO THE CITY AND THE PUBLIC INTEREST AND IS NOT PROHIBITED BY LAW.
29	§ 10-807. ALTERATION
30 31 32	An animal that becomes City property under this subtitle may be altered before being released for adoption, rescue, or otherwise, unless the animal weighs less than 2 pounds.

20	"Driving" means the process of using a horse:
21	(1) FOR RIDING; OR
22	(2) FOR PULLING A WAGON, CART, CARRIAGE, OR OTHER VEHICLE OR DEVICE.
23	(d) Driving license.
24 25	"Driving license" means a license issued by the Commissioner to use a horse:
26	(1) FOR RIDING; OR
27	(2) FOR PULLING A WAGON, CART, CARRIAGE, OR OTHER VEHICLE OR DEVICE.

1	(E) STABLE.
2	"STABLE" MEANS ANY PLACE WHERE HORSES ARE:
3	(1) BOARDED OR DISPLAYED;
4	(2) RENTED FOR RIDING, DRIVING, OR OTHER PURPOSES; OR
5	(3) BRED, BOUGHT, SOLD, TRAINED, OR TRADED.
6	(f) Stable operator.
7 8	"STABLE OPERATOR" MEANS THE PERSON WHO OWNS OR IS IN CHARGE OF A STABLE.
9	§ 10-902. Exemptions.
10	This subtitle does not apply to any horse that is:
11 12 13	(1) IN THE CUSTODY OF A ZOOLOGICAL PARK OR ITS AGENTS OR CONTRACTORS, IF THE ZOOLOGICAL PARK IS LICENSED UNDER THIS TITLE AND REGULATED BY A MARYLAND OR FEDERAL AGENCY;
14 15	(2) IN A LABORATORY WHERE SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH IS CARRIED OUT UNDER REGULATION OF A MARYLAND OR FEDERAL AGENCY; OR

18	PART II. DRIVING LICENSES
19	§ 10-905. Driving license required.

10	THE APPLICATION FOR A DRIVING LICENSE MUST:

26 27	(2) A CLEAR, FULL-FACE, HEAD-AND-SHOULDERS PHOTOGRAPH OF THE DRIVER THAT:
28	(I) WAS TAKEN WITHIN THE PRECEDING 12 MONTHS: AND

1	(II) MEASURES $1\frac{1}{4}$ " BY $1\frac{1}{4}$ ".
2	§ 10-908. Term.
3 4	Unless sooner suspended or revoked, a driving license expires annually on the anniversary date of its issuance.
5	§ 10-909. Denial, suspension, revocation, etc.
6 7	The Commissioner of Health may deny, amend, suspend, revoke, or refuse to renew a driving license as provided in Subtitle 2, Part III, of this title.
8	§§ 10-910 to 10-911. {RESERVED}
9	Part III. Required Care
10	§ 10-912. Examination by veterinarian.
11	(A) Annual examination required.
12 13	The custodian of every horse must have the horse examined by a veterinarian at least once a year.
14	(B) Scope of examination.
15	THE EXAMINATION MUST COVER:
16 17	(1) THE GENERAL CONDITION OF THE HORSE AND ITS TEETH, HOOFS, AND SHOES; AND

20	(c) Veterinarian's record.

23 24	(II) ANY PRESCRIPTION OR RECOMMENDATION FOR CURING OR CORRECTING THAT CONDITION OR FOR ANY OTHER DISPOSITION OF THE HORSE.
25 26	(2) THE VETERINARIAN MUST PROVIDE A COPY OF THAT RECORD TO THE HORSE'S CUSTODIAN.
27	(d) Custodian to retain records.
28	THE CUSTODIAN MUST:

1	(1) KEEP A COPY OF THE RECORD FOR AT LEAST 3 YEARS; AND
2 3 4	(2) MAKE IT AVAILABLE FOR INSPECTION BY AN ANIMAL ENFORCEMENT OFFICER, POLICE OFFICER, OR HUMANE OFFICER DURING NORMAL BUSINESS HOURS.

8	(A) Proper quarters required.	
9 10 11	(1) Every custodian must ensure that every horse is quartered in a lighted, clean, dry, and properly ventilated stable or barn and that all other requirements of this section are met.
