# **Major Issues Discussed**

- Chairman Burnett, the primary sponsor of the Resolution gave opening remarks. "He gave a
  brief overview of what Victory Gardens are; what the Resolution does and stated how the hearing
  would be conducted." The chairman also talked about the letters (written testimony) that were
  received from Green Street Academy; read a few of them and informed the attendees that copies
  of the letters were placed in the bill file.
- 2. Abby Cocke, Office of Sustainability gave a PowerPoint presentation about community gardens. A copy is on file.
- 3. Several representatives served as panelists and others speakers testified. Some highlighted topics and/or remarks were:
  - 1. The representative from **Black Yield Institute** talked about:
    - 1. What the organization does
    - 2. What the organization located in Cherry Hill does
      - Currently working on starting a food store in Cherry Hill
    - 3. Talked about:
      - the Urban Agriculture Initiative
      - Their food gardens
      - About how much food they are able to distribute to community as a result of the food gardens
      - Community garden makes up approximately 27 beds and grows fruit, vegetables and sunflowers
      - The bi-monthly pop-up market
      - Uses the voices of community for making progress
      - Comment: We build the community by using the land
  - 2. The representative from the <u>City Farms Program</u> talked about:
    - Is the Baltimore City Farms' Coordinator
    - What program does
    - There are 11 city gardens scatter throughout the city
    - Program participants ranges in ages from 21 years to 99 years' old
    - Teaches people how to cultivate and enrich soil; how to grow food and flowers
    - Distributes a lot of food to community
    - Program builds communities and engages people from diverse backgrounds and with common interest
    - Outreach efforts
    - Workshops are available and is a learning tool

- Funding sources
- A goal is to cultivate students to work in gardens
- The importance of understanding the environment; when gardening you come to understand the importance of the environment!
- Everyone across the country are now creating victory gardens
- The program is wonderful, he said.
- 3. The representative from Baltimore Green Space talked about:
  - There are over 248 garden spaces available and 60 to 90% are located in neighborhoods with low income
  - The pandemic has caused a rise in the use of the gardens
  - Been with the organization for over 8 years
  - Urges all to support Resolution
- 4. The representative from the **University of Maryland Extension Program** talked about:
  - Is his employer
  - The mission of the program and how it is funded
  - Teaches nutrition classes and does "canning"
  - Strongly supports the Resolution and can think of several positive reasons why
    we should have community gardens
  - Having these gardens helps facilitate communities to communicate more
  - 2. The representative from **Dodo Farms** talked about:
    - The importance of agriculture
    - Her farm is located in Montgomery County on two (2) acres of land
    - They only use natural products in their gardens; no chemical
    - Talked about some of the chemicals that are used in other food production facilities
    - The cost of land is high! Need to use land for what it was used for in the past!
    - The pandemic has shown the importance of growing food
    - Since the pandemic people are more particular about what they eat
    - Comment: "Farming While Black, is the same as being black"
    - About some of the obstacles associated with farming
    - Farming gardens were not very diverse in the beginning; but this have changed over time
    - Hope to engage more young people into agriculture; it is very rewarding
  - 3. Two people who called in testified. Highlighted comments, concerns, etc. were:
    - Supports Resolution
    - Question/Concern: How does the city plan to preserve the current gardens? A representative from the Office of Sustainability answered this question.
- 4. The committee/council members asked several questions and asked the panelists to <u>chime in</u> to answer. Some were:
  - 1. What are the biggest barriers to starting gardens? And, what are some ways the city can do better jobs?
    - Answers:
      - More education is needed for the public and communities
      - Easier access to capital is needed
      - More teaching in high schools
        - \* internships
        - \* teaching what agriculture is all about

- \* streamline the processes needed
- \* better water accessibility
- \* a lead area (one stop shop) is needed for community garden for those who want to take on gardening
- \*Comment: Some of the younger generation don't know where food comes from!
- \*Getting needed information out and need more curriculum in schools (More Green Schools)
- \* Land accessibility
- \* More tax credits needed
- \* Need more capacity
- \*Access to healthy soil
- \* More investment in public education
- 2. What would be the advice you give to people who want to start their own gardens?
  - Answers:
    - <u>Councilman Reisinger</u> explained what the people in his district does (Cherry Hill, Curtis Bay, and etc.) to start gardens. He also talked about student involvement in same.
    - <u>Councilwoman Clarke</u> talked about some of her childhood experiences associated with same:
      - As a child she lived with a world war victory garden; her family grew a garden along with others in the community
      - They often bartered with each other; depending on what each family grew
      - She also talked about the Baltimore Green Space Program; about why the program was started
      - She talked about some chemicals that are used in growing food today and that she is trying to stop some of those chemicals from being used
      - Chairman Burnett talked about how and why he started gardening:
        - Is an avid gardener himself
        - Experienced several problems in the beginning but eventually became addicted to gardening
        - Suggests starting small and then expand
        - Other answers given by Panelists were:
        - Patience is needed
        - Can't cut corners
        - Must establish motive and have a clear plan (is key for everything)
        - Be ready to correct mistakes
        - Keep at it and you will succeed
        - Planting is powerful and eventually you will see the long turn impact
        - Must be flexible and accessible to changing when necessary
- 5. Chairman Burnett explained what a Resolution does:
  - A Resolution is a way to getting information out
  - A way to having a meaning conversation(s)
  - Is a way to initiate conversations and for getting needed information to get things done
