Re: City Council Bill 18-0279 – City Streets – Closing – Dillon Street

Dear President and City Council Members:

The Law Department has reviewed City Council Bill 18-0279 for form and legal sufficiency. The bill would allow the City to condemn and close the part of Dillon Street described in the bill, which it no longer needs. The bill expressly reserves the rights the Mayor and City Council has in the structures located under the street bed, including access rights.

Section (34) of Article II of the City Charter grants the Mayor and City Council the power to “construct, open, extend, widen, straighten or close streets, bridges, tunnels or approaches to them and other public ways of every kind within the bounds of the City.” Section 116(b)(2) of Article VII of the City Charter requires the Department of Transportation to prepare all ordinances for the opening and closing of streets.

The Law Department approves the bill for form and legal sufficiency.
