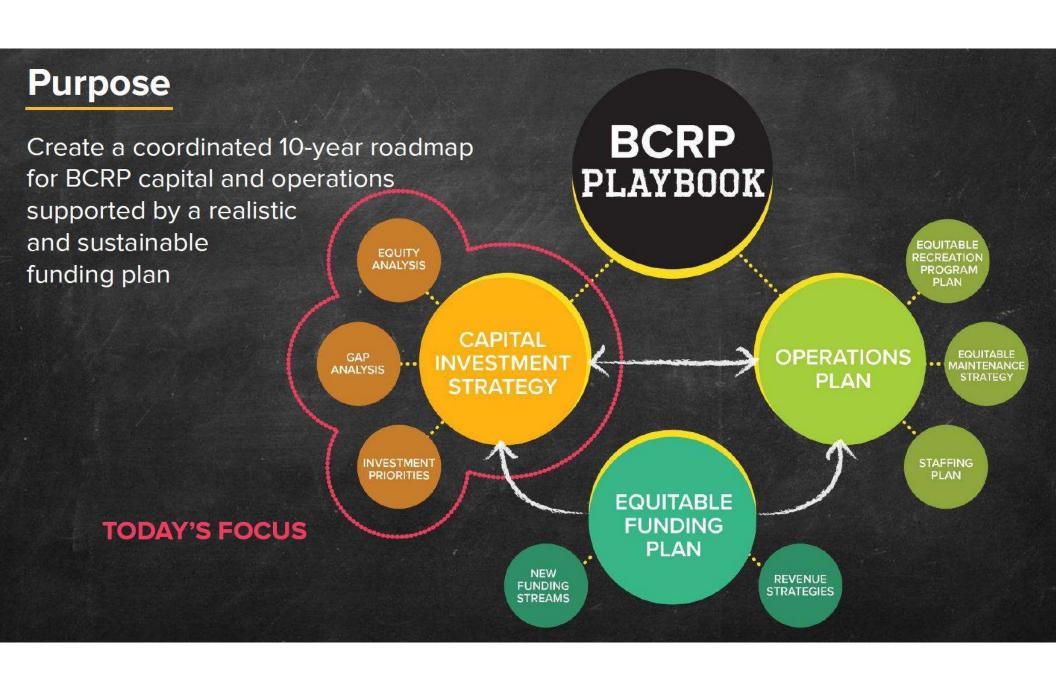

Even in 2021, when Baltimore had made good strides in growing its Operating & Capital budget for Rec & Parks, Baltimore was still funding its system at **84% of the average for its Peer Cities** and **55% of the average of the Aspirational Cities**.

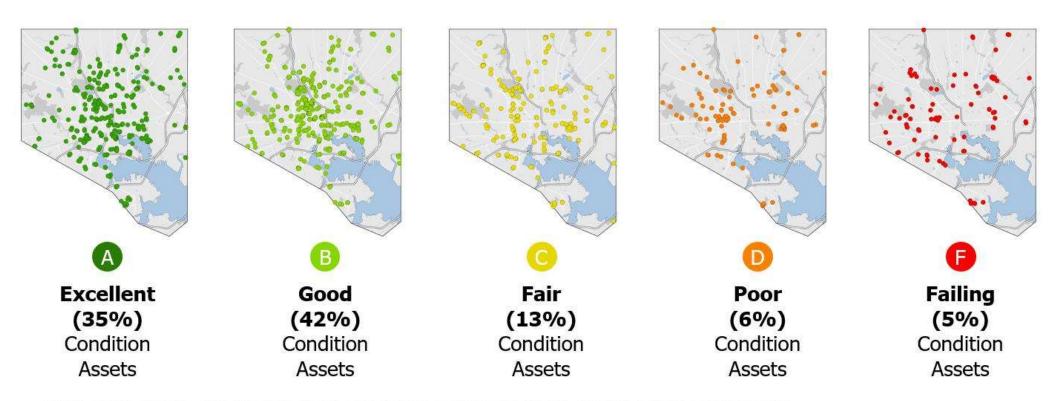

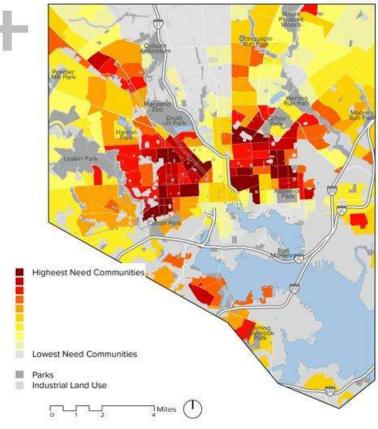
24% of all assets are in Fair, Poor, or Failing condition; that's nearly 1,300 park assets.

  - Opening in Summer 2024
