| 12 | later at the Alabama State Teachers College and at 20 married Raymond Parks, a barber; and |
| 13 | WHEREAS, Mrs. Parks, on December 1,1955, refused to give up her bus seat to a white |
| 14 | passenger in Montgomery, Alabama, resulting in her arrest; and |
| 15 | WHEREAS, Mrs. Parks' defiance triggered the famous Montgomery Bus Boycott and earned |
| 16 | her the title of Mother of the Civil Rights Movement; and |
| 17 | WHEREAS, The 382-day boycott introduced the world to Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, |
| 18 | Jr., who was President of the Montgomery Improvement Association and the Montgomery Bus |
| 19 | Boycott spokesperson; and |

| 20 | WHEREAS, The Federal District Court, on June 4, 1956, ruled bus segregation |

| 7 8 | WHEREAS, President Clinton presented Mrs. Parks with the Congressional Medal of Freedom in 1995; and |
| 9 10 | WHEREAS , Mrs Parks spend her last years in Detroit, where she died on October 24, 2005, at the age of 92. |
