**Position: Does Not Oppose**

The Department of Finance is herein reporting on C City Council Bill 21-0015R, the purpose of which is to approve the exchange of a Class B-D-7 License to a Class A-7 License for 2139 Pennsylvania Avenue.

**Background**

The passage of Senate Bill 519, Baltimore City-Alcoholic Beverages-Class A-7 License, in the 2018 Maryland General Assembly session authorized the Baltimore City Board of License Commissioners to issue a Class A-7 license. A Class A-7 License authorizes the sale of beer, wine, and liquor from 9:00am to 10:00pm Monday through Sunday and prohibits on-site consumption. The current license for 2139 Pennsylvania Avenue, Class B-D-7, authorizes the sale of beer, wine, and liquor for on- and off-premises consumption from 6:00am to 2:00am.

**Fiscal Impact**

The annual license fee for an A-7 license is \$1,500, compared to \$1,320 for a Class B-D-7 License. The City will receive an additional \$180 from this license change. While the license change reduces hours of operation, the City does not receive sales revenue from these purchases.

**Conclusion**

This bill approves the exchange of a Class B-D-7 License to a Class A-7 License for 2139 Pennsylvania Avenue, as authorized by the Maryland General Assembly. There is minimal fiscal impact of this license change.

**For the reasons stated above, the Department of Finance does not oppose City Council Bill 21-0015R.**
