#### A RESOLUTION ENTITLED

A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL concerning 1 The Baltimore City Comprehensive Master Plan 2 FOR the purpose of establishing a Comprehensive Master Plan for the City of Baltimore; and 3 providing for a special effective date. 4 Recitals 5 The Comprehensive Master Plan is being written in order to bring the City of Baltimore into 6 compliance with State of Maryland Planning Statutes and Baltimore City Charter Requirements. 7 The Baltimore City Master Plan will become the Plan that will guide the City's future 8 development. 9 The Plan is organized around a structure centered on 4 themes, and they are LIVE, EARN, 10 PLAY, and LEARN, which broad areas are meant to capture the main themes by which 11 Baltimore is experienced by its residents, workers, visitors and other stakeholders. Each of these 12 themes overlap with several of the "element" areas covered in Article 66B, § 3.05 of the 13 Maryland Code, to ensure coverage of these areas. 14 The Plan meets the Baltimore City Charter requirements under Article VII, §§ 72 and 74. 15 The Plan is designed to capitalize on the research and public outreach conducted for 16 PlanBaltimore in the late 1990s, while having research and outreach conducted specifically for 17 18 the Plan. The Plan also has Management and Financial information following the 4 main chapters, 19 which detail the structure of the organizations that will implement the Plan, as well as the City's 20 capital budgeting process.
