Subject: Shrink police budget and address the real crisis

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Dear Marguerite Currin,

It is well documented that our systems are unfair. White communities with money receive different city services than poor communities of color do. From police to trash pick up, things are different. The fight to address police harassment and brutality as well as the fight to get adequate protection in poor communities will always be overshadowed by the larger structural issues at play between police and oppressed communities.

The problem is that police are best suited to address violent crime, despite the fact that the majority of the calls for service that they receive are nonviolent in nature. A parent calls because her son has stayed out late again, an elderly neighbor calls because kids are being loud outside, the same couple struggling with domestic violence keeps calling, etc. Police find themselves ill-equipped to handle the deeper issues at play and citizens don't know what to do in a moment of crisis so they call police. Police bring a gun, a badge and an enforcement and obedience mentality to a battle that requires teachers, social workers or other caring advocates.

Communities need equity and a set of supports that help them through crises as well as the larger issue at play but instead get enforcement. This is a recipe for tension. No matter how well officers are trained, the tensions between oppressed and oppressor are embedded in the culture and role of police and historically oppressed communities. If our interventions or reforms focus on the moment of interaction between police and citizens, we are intervening too late. Body cameras, better training and better selection of officers all focus on how to make the police/community interaction better but miss the key point: the relationship is designed to fail. We need a reorganizing of the system that minimizes this interaction. While we likely do need an improved entity that addresses violent crime, the calls for service show we don't need this to be as large as it is. Instead we need strategies that address the community's needs.

We need alternative structures that allow for a reduction in the contact that police and community have. We would like to see non-police units that respond to nonviolent calls staffed by social workers and those trained to care, support, teach, resolve conflict and get to the bottom of the issues that people are facing. We already have restorative justice models that are highly effective in diverting crime that we could build on.

There are lots of other important prevention strategies we need: more recreation centers and things for young people to do, more jobs that are accessible to ex-offenders and more drug treatment. These solutions are essential but we also have to address the immediate tensions and fears people feel.

Dear Baltimore City Council & Mayor,

I am Ro Lane, and I am writing on behalf of Baltimore Roundtable for Economic Democracy (BRED) and our network of worker-owned small businesses in Baltimore. We are a coalition of worker cooperatives, advocates, and technical assistance providers committed to building a robust cooperative ecosystem in Maryland & nationally.

We urge you to make substantive changes to the proposed Fiscal Year 2021 budget to (1) defund the Baltimore City Police Department and (2) reinvest in programs and services to address the root causes of crime and violence in our city in a sustainable way that values Black lives and dignity.

While all other agencies are asked to find 5% budget cuts and those experiencing homelessness are still living in dangerous conditions in shelters under COVID-19, the Baltimore City Police Department is going to see its budget increase to over half a billion dollars under this proposal. We ask for a new FY2021 budget that radically reinvests these dollars elsewhere. We particularly want to see (1) BCPD be held accountable for consistently spending over budget, (2) defunding of any surveillance program (aerial, phone data, etc.), which assumes all Baltimore city residents are guilty, and (3) removal of former military equipment/tear gas/etc from the police department's use.

Baltimore City is not made safer by the police department and the criminal justice system as-is. We must be bold and far-seeing as we seek to create a better Baltimore, and our budget must reflect our city's true priorities. Increasing the BPD budget, allowing them to spy on residents, and utilize military equipment perpetuates anti-blackness in a predominantly Black city. An increase in policing is an increase for violence in our city. Budgets are moral documents.

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Hello Ms. Currin,

My name is Samantha Green and I am a Baltimore resident. In the midst of this pandemic and public outcry against police brutality, it feels especially inappropriate to propose an increase to the BPD budget to \$545 million. I urge you to ethically reallocate this increase, as well as a meaningful portion of the remaining BPD budget, towards social services and education. Investment in programs such as the Affordable Housing Trust Fund, Baltimore Children and Youth Fund, Safe Streets Baltimore, the Office of Employment and Development, or the Department of Health, shows our commitment to communities and the vision that all Baltimore residents deserve to thrive. Historically, the city government has spent far more on police than on public health, homeless services, youth services, and other vital agencies. This while the Baltimore Police Department disproportionately targets nonwhite residents—from traffic stops to the use of lethal force.

It's time to staunch the expansion of the BPD's mandate into homeless services, schools, youth services, mental health, and other social services where an armed police force simply doesn't belong. It's time to protect investments in human services, the social safety net, and racial and economic justice.
