Major Issues Discussed

- 1. Councilmember Conway, sponsor of the bill, gave opening remarks on the purpose and intent of the bill.
- 2. Chairman Costello went over the agency reports with the agency representatives.
- 3. Councilmember McCray asked about the difference between an incinerator and a crematorium. Councilmember Conway noted that a crematorium is an incinerator, but some differences exist.
- 4. Councilmember McCray asked if there was an analysis done on the financial impact this would have on businesses. Councilmember Conway noted there was not a full economic analysis on this.
- 5. Councilmember Stokes asked about the impact on funeral homes with this bill, and the financial impact on people in the city seeking affordable cremation and funeral services.
- 6. Councilmember Stokes asked about families without insurance who may experience price hikes due to funeral homes having off-site crematoriums. Councilmember Conway noted that the need will continue to be met.
- 7. Nine people signed up to testify. The following were some of the topics discussed:
 - Residents' concerns with toxic material in the air after cremation services
 - Crematoriums sending out unrecognizable emissions.
 - Environmental justice
 - Representatives for funeral homes noted that the human body is 80% water and foreign objects in the body are not burned, but manually disposed of.
 - Representatives for funeral homes noted the financial impact on local funeral homes, which may cause loss of business.
 - Representatives for funeral homes noted there are studies noting that there are no negative impacts on crematorium emissions.
 - Regulations are needed
 - This bill will disproportionally impact Black funeral homes in the city
- 8. Councilmember Dorsey asked if there are local funeral homes that have off-site crematoriums or third-party crematorium services. Mr. March, who signed up to testify, noted that Marsh's Funeral Home is the only one that maintains off-site crematoriums.
- 9. Councilmember Conway gave closing remarks.
- 10. No quorum. Hearing recessed.
