1 A COUNCIL RESOLUTION concerning

2 **Investigative Hearing - Baltimore City Police Staffing, Recruitment, and Retention**

3 FOR the purpose of requesting that the Baltimore City Police Commissioner appear before the  
4 City Council to brief it regarding recruitment efforts, officer retention, and recouping training  
5 dollars, report on the number and percentage of individuals that enroll in the police academy,  
6 graduate from the police academy, and are employed by the Baltimore Police Department  
7 after graduation, and discuss the retention rate of those employed by the Baltimore Police  
8 Department, the deployment of officers, and how that deployment will enable the City to  
9 curtail the rise in violent crime.

10 **Recitals**

11 Baltimore City ended 2016 with 318 homicides. In February 2017, Baltimore City has  
12 already surpassed 42 homicides, more than 140 people have been shot, and 92 people have been  
13 the victim of a carjacking. By any measure, Baltimore City has a violent crime problem.

14 On January 12, 2017, Baltimore City and the Department of Justice filed a consent decree in  
15 Federal Court. This consent decree outlines reforms aimed at improving nearly every facet of  
16 policing and community relations in Baltimore City.

17 The Fiscal Year 2017 Ordinance of Estimates budgeted over \$480 million to the Baltimore  
18 Police Department. This figure includes funding for 3,125 funded positions. Compared to the  
19 Fiscal Year 2012 budget, this budget is \$100 million greater but represents a decrease of nearly  
20 350 funded positions, more than 250 of those positions in police patrol.

21 On February 21, 2017, the Baltimore City Council received a budget update that shows  
22 expenditures for the Police Department are projected to end 2017 with a \$17.8 million deficit,  
23 including an overtime deficit of \$27 million. The majority of this overtime spending is due to  
24 “staffing shortages as well as investigations and homicides”.

25 Baltimore City needs a strategy to address violent crime and respond to the need for  
26 community police, while recruiting, training, and hiring employees and controlling spending.

27 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE,** That the  
28 Council requests that the Baltimore City Police Commissioner appear before it to brief the
