**A COUNCIL RESOLUTION CONCERNING**

**Informational Hearing – Feral Cats**

2 FOR the purpose of requesting that representatives from the Health Department’s Office of  
3 Animal Control appear before the City Council to discuss feral cats in Baltimore and whether  
4 the City’s current approach to feral cats should be modified or remain the same.

**Recitals**

6 Feral cats, cats that are unsocialized to humans and have a temperament of extreme fear of  
7 and resistance to contact with humans, are a reality in all communities, and Baltimore is no  
8 exception. Over time, understandings about how they should be treated have evolved and a  
9 number of different approaches to managing their presence in urban areas have been tried.

10 Nearly 10 years ago Baltimore changed its laws on, and approach to, feral cats to encourage  
11 efforts by the City and private individuals to trap, alter, vaccinate, ear tip, and return feral cats.  
12 Provisions were also added to the law to allow feral cat caregivers to engage with feral cats and  
13 feral cat colonies without violating City law.

14 A decade into this approach it is appropriate to review how it is working in Baltimore and  
15 whether or not changes may be required. The effects of this policy on cats, communities, and  
16 Animal Control employees should be examined to see if it is succeeding in its goals or if  
17 modifications to the current approach would benefit everyone involved.

18 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE**, That the  
19 Council requests that representatives from the Health Department’s Office of Animal Control  
20 appear before it to discuss feral cats in Baltimore and whether the City’s current approach to feral  
21 cats should be modified or remain the same.

22 **AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Mayor, the  
23 Health Commissioner, the Director of Animal Control, and the Mayor’s Legislative Liaison to  
24 the City Council.
