BACKGROUND

On October 21, 2025, the Housing & Economic Development Committee held a hearing on Resolution 25-0003R Informational Hearing – Permit Reform. This hearing focused on several points of how the permit process in Baltimore has been working and what improvements and updates the Administration has been working on. Topics included:

The implementation of the Accela Permitting system

- What role did BCIT play in the discovery phase of choosing Accela
- How was the testing of the system conducted? Which staff were involved in this testing
 - How were technical issues handled – how were they resolved?

DHCD Inspection/Permit Process

- How can DHCD be more proactive in getting inspections for permits done,
- What is the current backlog
- Concerns around the use of auto permits in some instances

- For these permits, DHCD noted that the applicant doesn't get to choose if an application is auto permitted or not and that fraud under that system would still be subject to the same penalties.
 - Use and Occupancy Permits backlog currently has a 3-month timeline
 - Permit is dependent on the applicant moving the process forward – there are issues with each applicant that drive that timeline.

Workflow Automation

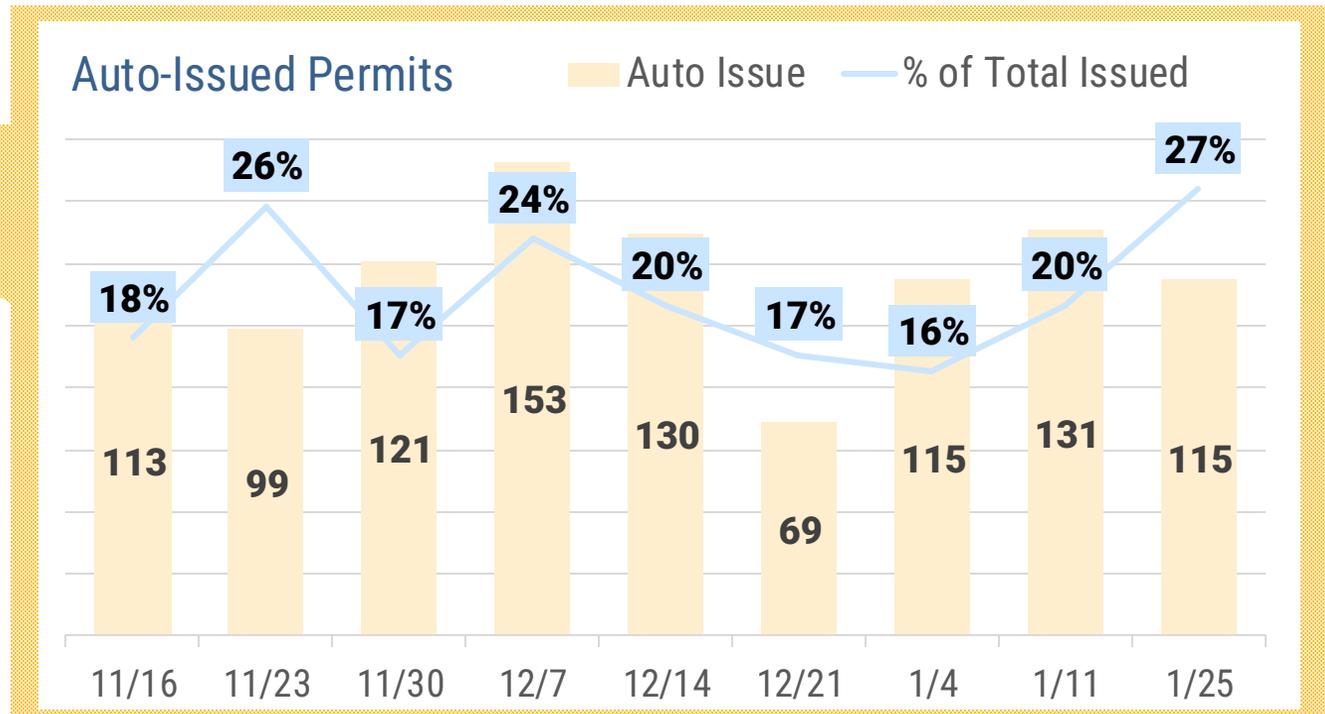
- **Auto-Issuance** for simpler permits
- **Expanded Auto-Assignment** so permits move instantly to the correct team
- **Automated Routing** for denied reviews

Process Consistency

- **Removal of Redundant Steps** such as duplicate zoning reviews
- **“Gating Rules”** for who can make changes
- **Refined Inspection Logic**

Improved Applicant Experience

- **Automated Status Notifications**
- **Clarified Application Questions and Instructions**
- **Contractor Requirement Visibility** at the intake stage

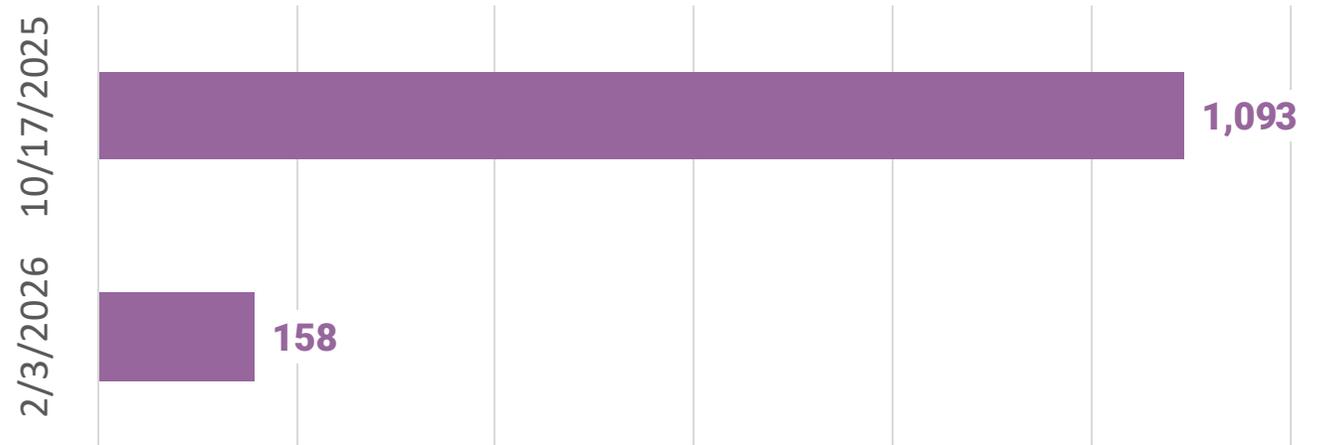

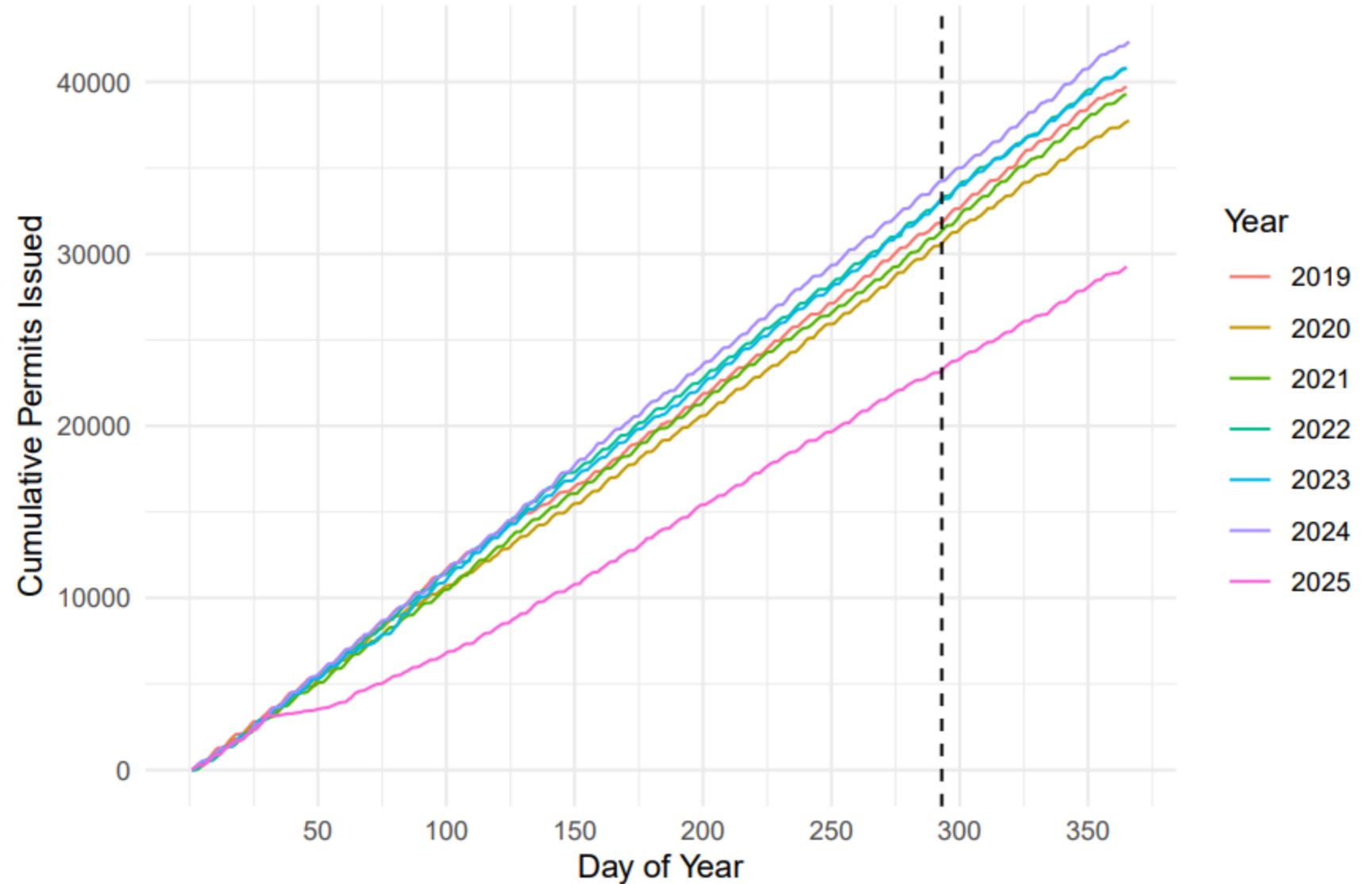

Cumulative Annual Permits Issued

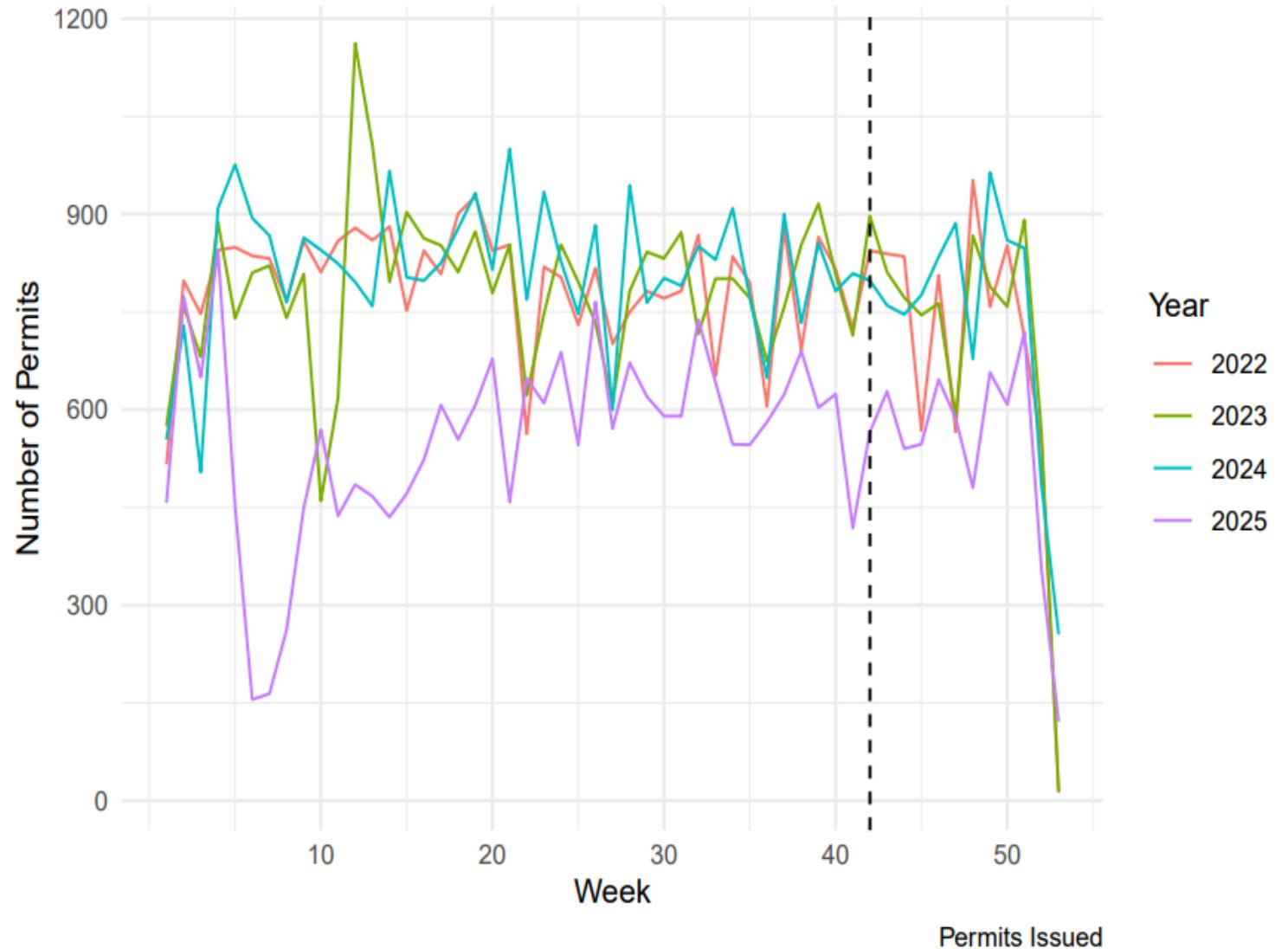

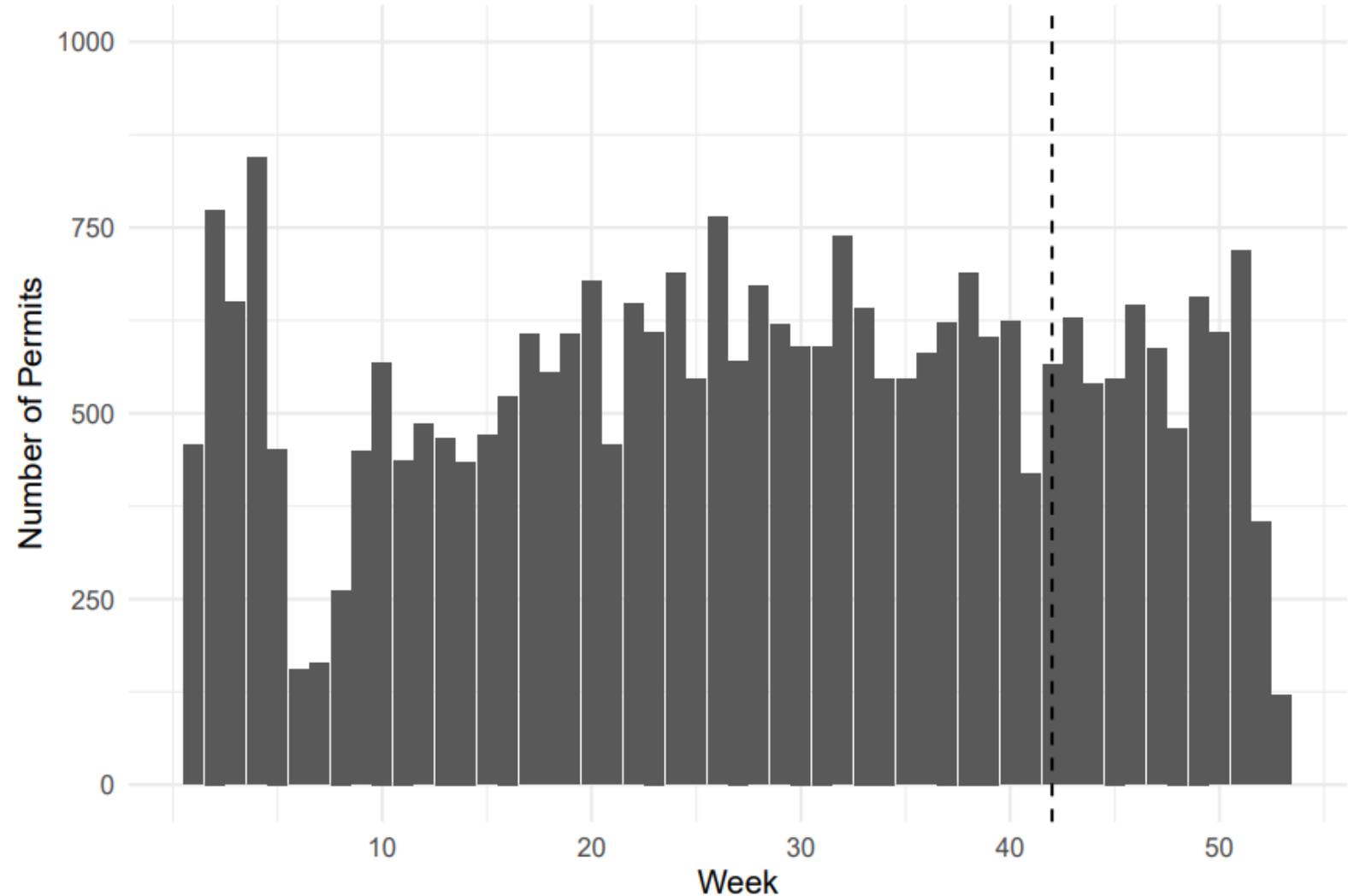
Weekly Permits Issued - History

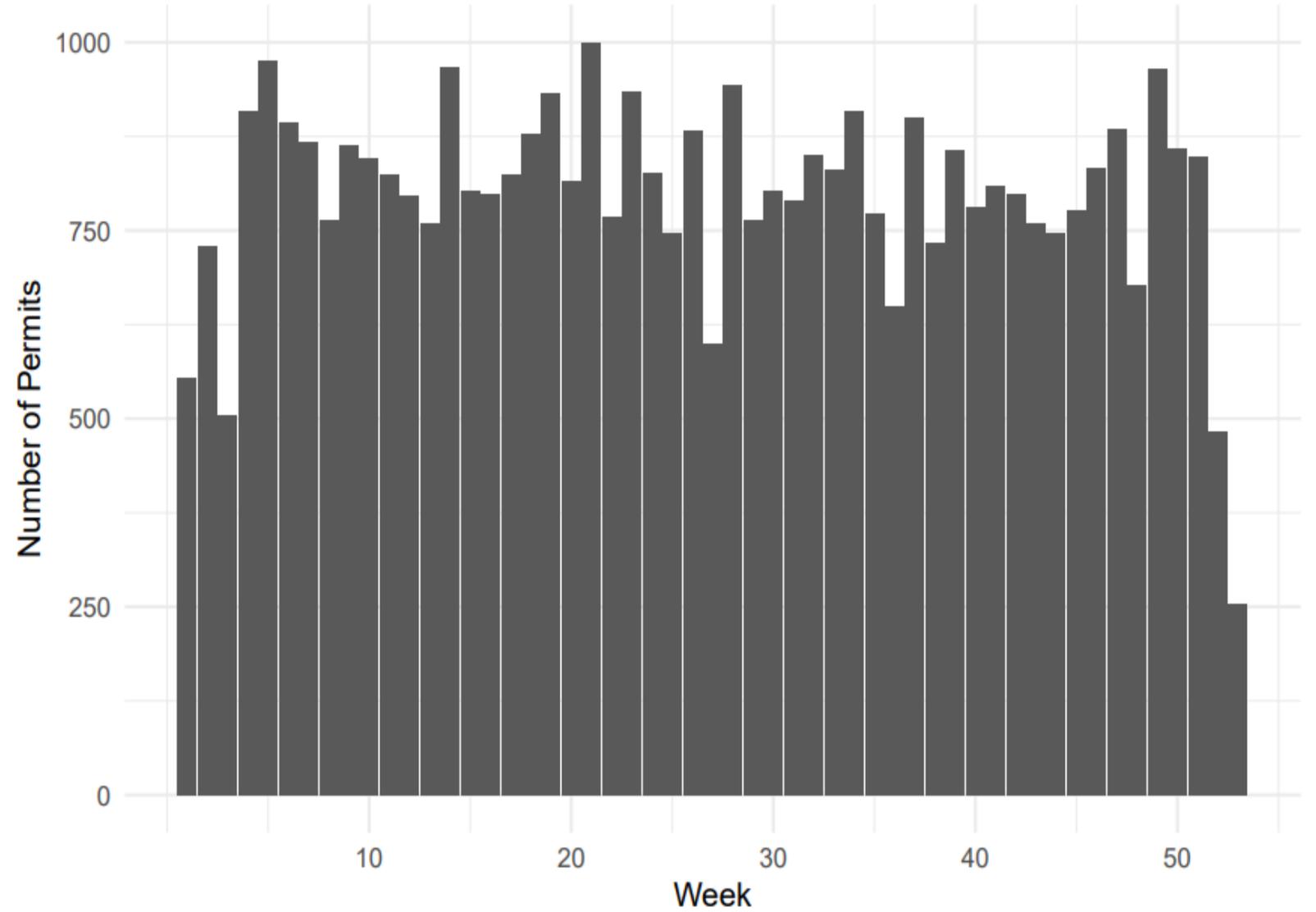
