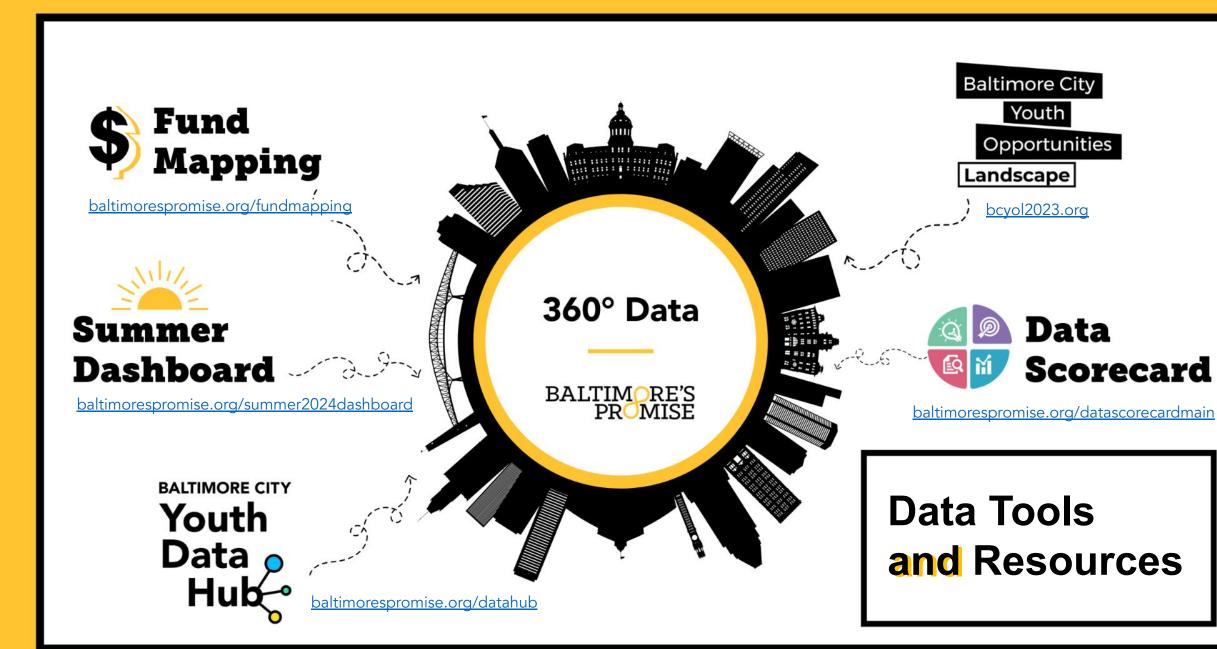

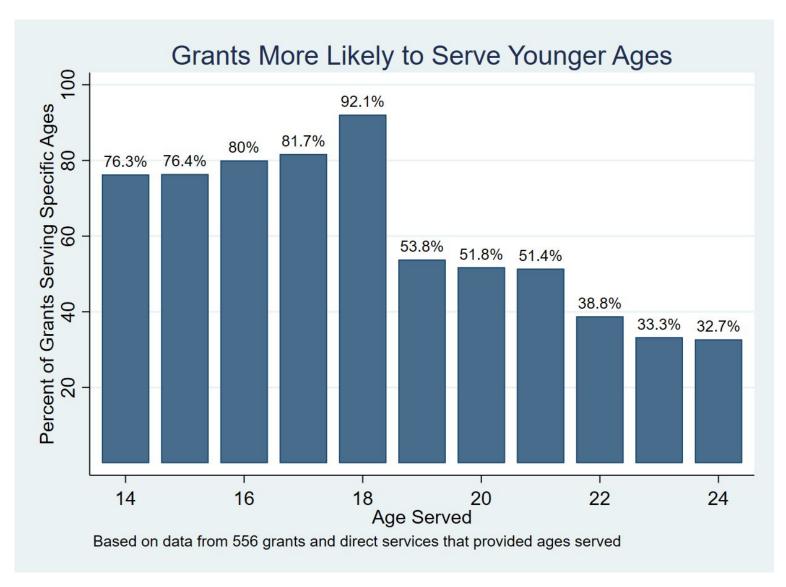




### Fund Mapping in Baltimore City: Where are Programming Dollars Going

### **SUMMER 2025 is AT RISK**

Early projections of upcoming summer programming include a decrease in program capacity by at least 12,000 opportunities—30% less than last year's capacity—including early projections from Summer Funding Collaborative + City Schools.

Youthworks still needs increased funding to maintain 2024 levels.

Past year gains are at risk of evaporating in vital areas, including comprehensive programming, older youth programming, and evening programming.

Summer programming improves lives for Baltimore youth:

- Provides joyful learning experiences
- Combats summer learning loss
- Provides more food security
- Supports youth crime prevention





# The Promise of Summer: Why Summer?

Summer is a critical time to prevent learning loss and expand opportunities for all children. However, access to enriching summer experiences varies widely based on a child's socioeconomic background. Without structured engagement, students—especially those from low-income communities—face significant setbacks.

#### **What Research Shows Nationally:**

- More than two-thirds of the 9th-grade reading achievement gap is due to summer learning loss during elementary years.
- Math skills decay more rapidly during the summer than reading skills because math instruction is primarily school-based, whereas reading is often practiced at home.
- Students who rely on school lunches lose access to those meals during the summer.



# Safer Summers = Safer Communities



In 2024, Baltimore City saw a 34% increase in summer program opportunities for older youth (19-24) compared to 2023, with more programs available in the evening. During this time, youth crime dropped by 24%. This underscores the vital role of summer programs in providing positive opportunities for young people.

**Expanding summer opportunities is an important way of creating safer communities for everyone.**

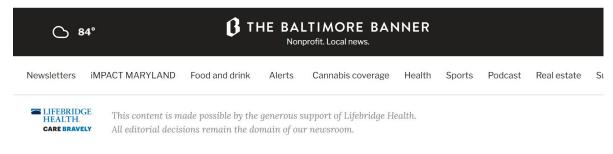
For every 4 youth aged 0-24 in Baltimore, only 1 summer opportunity exists.

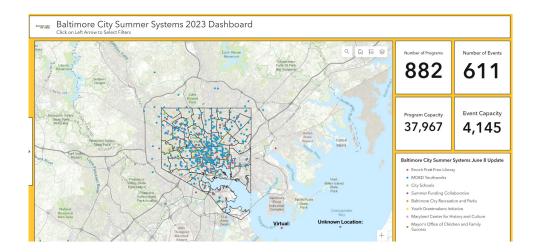

# Baltimore hopes keeping teens busy this summer will keep them safe

#### 'More structure'

Even with such a collective focus from elected leaders on getting kids involved this summer, opportunities in Baltimore fall far short of reaching many of the city's young people.

Tracking by the youth-focused nonprofit Baltimore's Promise has found that programs provided by Baltimore City and other major outreach organizations will provide slots for about 38,000 kids this summer, well below the 83,000 enrollment in the public school system. The gap is even larger if you include the tens of thousands more residents between high school age and 24 years old — a demographic Baltimore's Promise CEO Julia Baez noted often deals with many of the same pressures as teens.

# Why Do We Care? Post-Secondary Pathways Report

in the Maryland workforce





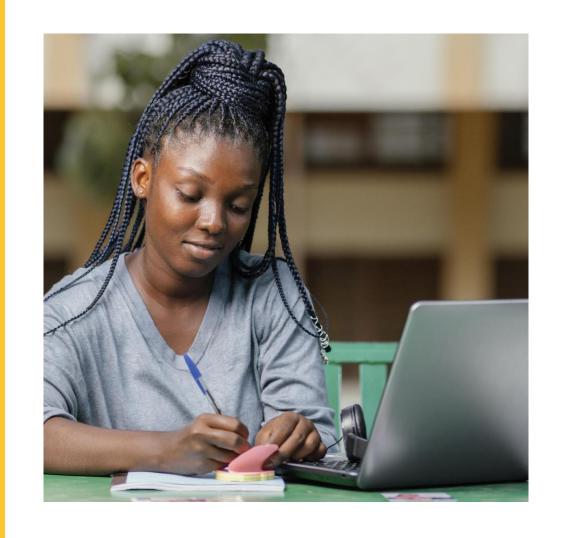

Grads2Careers establishes a pathway for recent Baltimore City Public Schools graduates who are not planning to enter college full time within the next year — into career-track jobs in high-demand, high-growth industries, on the path to a family-supporting wage.









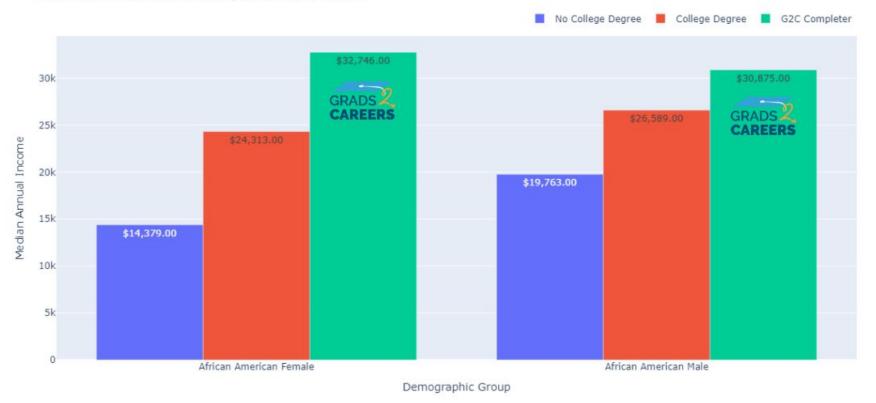


### Post-Secondary Pathways Report vs. Current G2C



### **G2C** Outcomes

Median Annual Income of City Schools Graduates



The median annual income of G2C completers is significantly higher than that of 2009 City Schools graduates six years after high school graduation, even compared to those who earned a college degree.

G2C wage data as of September 30, 2024. To account for inflation, all wages adjusted to 2024 dollars.



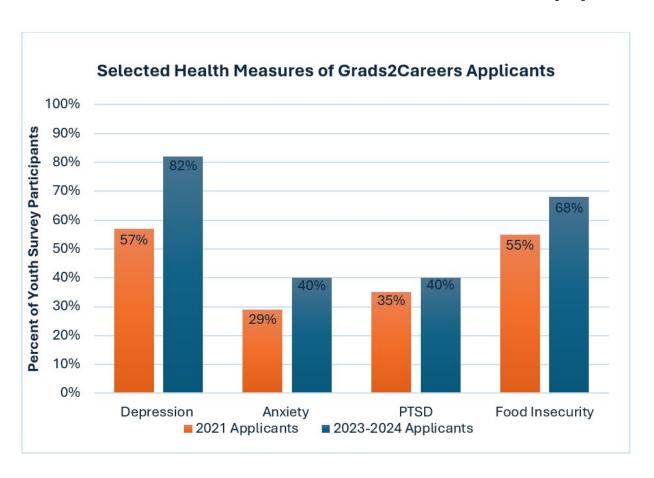




### Post-Secondary Pathways Report vs. Current G2C



# Health Outcomes of G2C Applicants



Through a partnership with the Center for Adolescent Health at JHU, we surveyed G2C applicants to understand the role youth health plays in occupational skills training program participation and completion. As a part of the survey, we asked participants about Depression symptoms, Anxiety symptoms, Post traumatic stress disorder symptoms, and Food insecurity using validated measures.







# Why CareerBound?

Research has shown us the "college or bust" mentality doesn't work for everyone. The need for career training opportunities that lead to family-supporting wages prompted the creation of Grads2Careers in 2018.

### But more is needed.

Building on the success and strong foundation of Grads2Careers, Baltimore's Promise and its partners began advancing into its

next phase in 2024: CareerBound.

#### The Need for a Youth Data Hub in Baltimore

### **Before the Youth Data Hub...**

- Partners unable to readily share individual-level data between each other
- Lack of understanding on who is and is not being served by public institutions
- Lack of data infrastructure that centered community and youth voices and experiences

#### **Executive Committee**

The Executive Committee, comprised of the Baltimore City mayor and the City Schools' CEO, or their designees, meets quarterly to provide vision, oversight, and leadership for the Youth Data Hub.

#### **Community Research and Action Committee**

The C-RAC is comprised of community members, including youth. It meets monthly and serves to increase awareness of, and provide feedback on, the Youth Data Hub.

- Community-Centered Data Access & Use: We are ensuring that decisions about who can access and use data are made with the community at the center, which will directly inform policy and programs.

Together, these advancements mean we are building a better, more informed Baltimore that can act on the insights we gain from the data.
