Stormwater Advisory Committee – DRAFT Recommendations to City Council - 1/28/2019

- Water affordability is a priority issue for City residents Council and DPW need to communicate on this topic
- DPW and nonprofit partners should implement an education campaign on the stormwater remediation requirements imposed by regulators
- DPW should update residents on progress toward required stormwater remediation goals
- DPW needs to keep the Council informed as to whether the permit schedule is being met
- DPW needs to be transparent with residents and businesses about fee dollars received and how those dollars are being used to remediate stormwater runoff
- Education on the negative effects of impervious surfaces is needed for residents
- Lack of equity in the regional water system ie. City residents are charged more than county residents needs to be addressed
- City should explore a fee for service model as a means of accomplishing more remediation with existing dollars (Anne Arundel model)
- City should explore purchase of stormwater credits from remediated acreage outside the City
- The residential/community credit program needs to be overhauled to become more timely, accurate and effective
- The administrative function within the credit program requires better staff training, timeliness and accountability
- The community grants program should be expanded to be comparable to other large jurisdictions in Maryland
- Education on various practices for stormwater remediation is needed for residents – ie. trash management
- Funding for various practices needs to be re-evaluated to ensure maximum return on dollars spent ie. street sweeping vs. impervious removal
