ANALYSIS

The resolution invites agency representatives and other stakeholders to update the City Council on services provided to and the general well-being of the transgender community in Baltimore City. Transgender¹ and gender-expansive² people face many barriers to full and equal participation in society, including stigma and cultural marginalization, lack of family acceptance, a hostile political climate, discrimination in education and employment, difficulty accessing healthcare and social services, and unequal treatment by the criminal justice system. These barriers can have long-term impacts on mental health and economic and housing stability, especially if individuals experience familial rejection and isolation from social support systems. Transgender individuals are also at higher risk of experiencing violence. Transgender women of color, who must also contend with racism and sexism prevalent in our society, are even further impacted by these issues.
