



Common side effects are mild to moderate and last 1-3 days.


In the arm where you get the shot:

- Pain
- Redness
- Swelling

The rest of the body: Tiredness Headache **Muscle** pain **Joint pain** Fever Lymph node swelling **Nausea (J&J specific)**



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Where can residents get vaccinated?


- There are numerous locations residents can get vaccinated in the city – local pharmacies, community health centers, hospitals, BCHD mobile response team clinics and mass vaccination sites

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-Clinics on the map include BCHD administered vaccine and external clinical partner administered vaccine with BCHD involvement -Point locations represent both community clinics and facilities vaccinated through BCHD efforts (e.g. senior housing, group homes) -Multiple clinics may have occurred at a single location -All clinics not represented on the map as some are street-based outreach

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Overarching strategic goals

Goal 3: By March 2021 have a robust data management, monitoring and evaluation system providing transparent reporting to

City and all partners.



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

COVID-19 vaccination dashboard




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Benchmarks for Goal 1

- Vaccinate 135,000 residents by April 30, 2021
- Vaccinate 40% of the population by August 31, 2021
- Vaccinate 60% of the population by November 30, 2021
- Vaccinate 80% of the population by February 28, 2022

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


Pediatric Vaccination strategy

- Partnering with City Schools to hold vaccination events at 9 schools geographically spread throughout the city
- Exit survey on parental attitudes, motivation and experience with vaccination
- Working with City Schools to integrate COVAX into back-to-school vaccination campaign; vaccination in school health centers
- Contracting with community partners for pediatric vax education/communication, vaccine administration and recruitment of vaccine peer ambassadors
- Holding pediatric- focused listening sessions
- Future deployment of pediatric VALUE communities peer ambassadors

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Challenges and opportunities to reaching 80% by Feb 2022

- Demand for vaccine is slowing down
- Vaccine is widely available and many are still unvaccinated
- We are refocusing our strategy on direct outreach and education by trusted messengers – "the ground game"
- Now is the critical time to engage the entire City with neighborhood canvassing and door-to-door outreach
- The health department collaborates with the Mayor's Office of Neighborhoods and community partners for weekly canvassing.

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ADDRESSING MYTHS & HESITANCY

How to talk to those who are hesitant

How to respond to misinformation

Provide warnings— If you have to refer to the misperception, provide an explicit warning that the upcoming information is false

Emphasize facts - Don't repeat the myth as this can

just reinforce it. Start with core facts and keep it simple

Use nudges/defaults— Use the framing where COVID-19 vaccination is the default behavior

Focus on the disease – Pivot the conversation to the disease itself and provide correct explanations
