Analysis

Current Law

Baltimore City Code – Article 1, Subtitle 1-City Council, Section 1-6

§ 1-6. Agencies to provide legislative information.

It shall be the duty of the head of every City department or bureau established by the Baltimore City Charter or by ordinance to provide all technical materials, plats, drawings, and information that are requested by any member or the President of the City Council for the purpose of introducing legislation into the Council. (City Code, 1976/83, art. 1, §6.) (Ord. 76-080.)

Background

Per the primary sponsor, "This Resolution came about on behalf of student constituents. Many students commute to school, some take multiple buses to school, some are sexually harassed. We must made sure our students get to school safe and on time. The hearing will give students the opportunity to talk about their experiences while getting to school."

On Thursday, December 16, 2021, pertinent representatives will come before the committee to discuss this issue.

The Baltimore City Health Department (BCHD) is pleased to have the opportunity to review Council Bill #21-0056R, entitled, "From Front Door to Schoolhouse Door." This resolution invites representatives from the Department of Transportation, Department of Health, Baltimore City Public Schools, Mayor's Office of Children and Family Success and Office of Equity and Civil Rights to discuss our children's commute to school."

Both safe transportation and access to quality education are considered key social determinants of health. Social determinants of health are the "conditions in the places where people live, learn, work, and play that affect a wide range of health risks and outcomes." By addressing the environment in which people live, learn, work, and play, we are able to address the "upstream" factors that contribute to a person's health and well-being and to health disparities. BCHD understands the importance of a safe travel environment in obtaining quality education, access to recreational opportunities, and preventing added trauma in the lives of our young residents.

BCHD urges a **favorable** report on Council Bill #21-0056R. While we support any opportunities to improve school performance, attendance in extracurricular activities, and safety of young people, BCHD currently does not have an active role in the commute of students on their way to and from school and we therefore defer to the agencies that play a more direct role.

Informational Hearing – From Front Door to Schoolhouse Door 2 FOR the purpose of inviting representatives from the Department of Transportation, Department 3 of Health, Baltimore City Public Schools, Mayor's Office of Children and Family Success 4 5 and Office of Equity and Civil Rights to discuss our children's commute to school. Recitals 6 In Baltimore City Public Schools, approximately 29,000 students take MTA public transit to 7 school. Nearly three out of every four middle and high school students in our district rely on 8 9 buses, light rail, and subways regularly. MTA service is designed primarily with adult commuters in mind, not the 18% of ridership who are children on their way to learn. 10

As such, our students face challenging obstacles on their way to and from school buildings. Due to school choice, many young people take lengthy rides to schools that are far from their neighborhoods, leading to increases in tardiness and absences which affect their education. Students often avoid taking part in after-school extracurricular activities and employment because of safety concerns on their evening trips home in the dark, with 32% of students saying they do not feel safe on their way to and from school. Young women commonly experience sexual harassment during their trips.

The City Council would like to determine the safety of our students on their commutes to school, the equatability of public transit for our students, and the impact of public transit on student attendance, academic outcomes, extracurricular activities, and employment.
