3	FOR the purpose of requiring homeless shelters and transitional housing units programs within
4	the City of Baltimore to place a notice regarding a certain human trafficking prevention
5	hotline in certain locations; providing that the required human trafficking notices may be
6	obtained from the United States Department of Homeland Security's Blue Campaign website;
7	providing for certain penalties; and generally relating to human trafficking notice
8	requirements for homeless shelters and transitional housing units programs.

5	"Homeless" or "homelessness" means an individual's state of:
6 7	(1) HAVING NO PRESENT POSSESSORY INTEREST IN A LIVING ACCOMMODATION AND LACKING THE MEANS NECESSARY TO OBTAIN THAT INTEREST; AND
8	(2) HAVING A POSSESSORY INTEREST IN A LIVING ACCOMMODATION BUT:
9	(I) THE INABILITY TO SECURE ENTRY INTO THAT ACCOMMODATION; OR
10 11	(II) OCCUPATION OF THE ACCOMMODATION WOULD LIKELY LEAD TO VIOLENCE FROM ANOTHER OCCUPANT.
