Financial Terminology

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Term

Description

Example

Commitment

Total investment across all fiscal years. Fully executed agreement with an agency and/or a formal public announcement including the total investment.

MOED will receive \$30M for workforce development

Obligation

Budgeted amount for a specific fiscal year as included in the executed agreement and reported to the U.S. Treasury.

Of the \$30M committed, \$3.7M budgeted for FY 2022.

Expenditure

Amount charged to ARPA accounts. Funding has moved to organization. Amount reported to treasury.

MOED spent \$305K through April 2022 as charged to ARPA accounts.

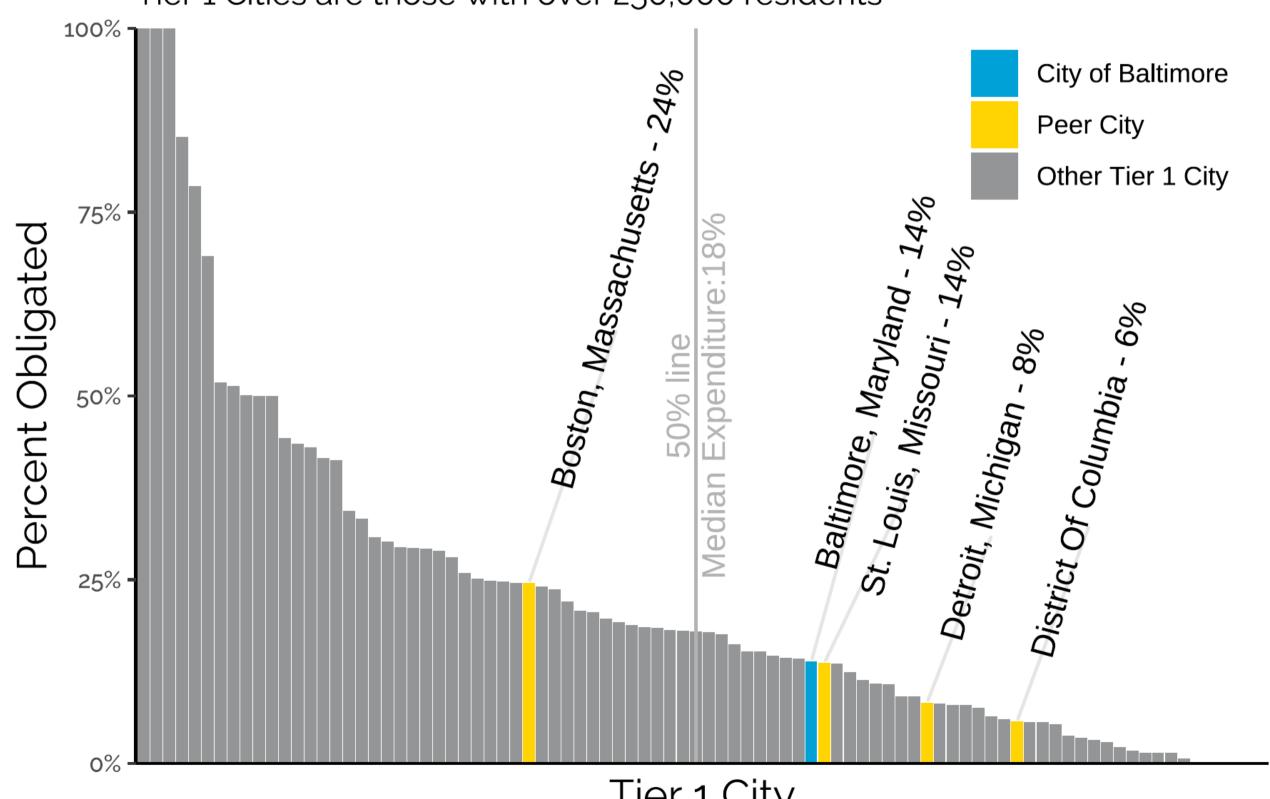
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Tier 1 Cities Obligations

Tier 1 Cities are those with over 250,000 residents

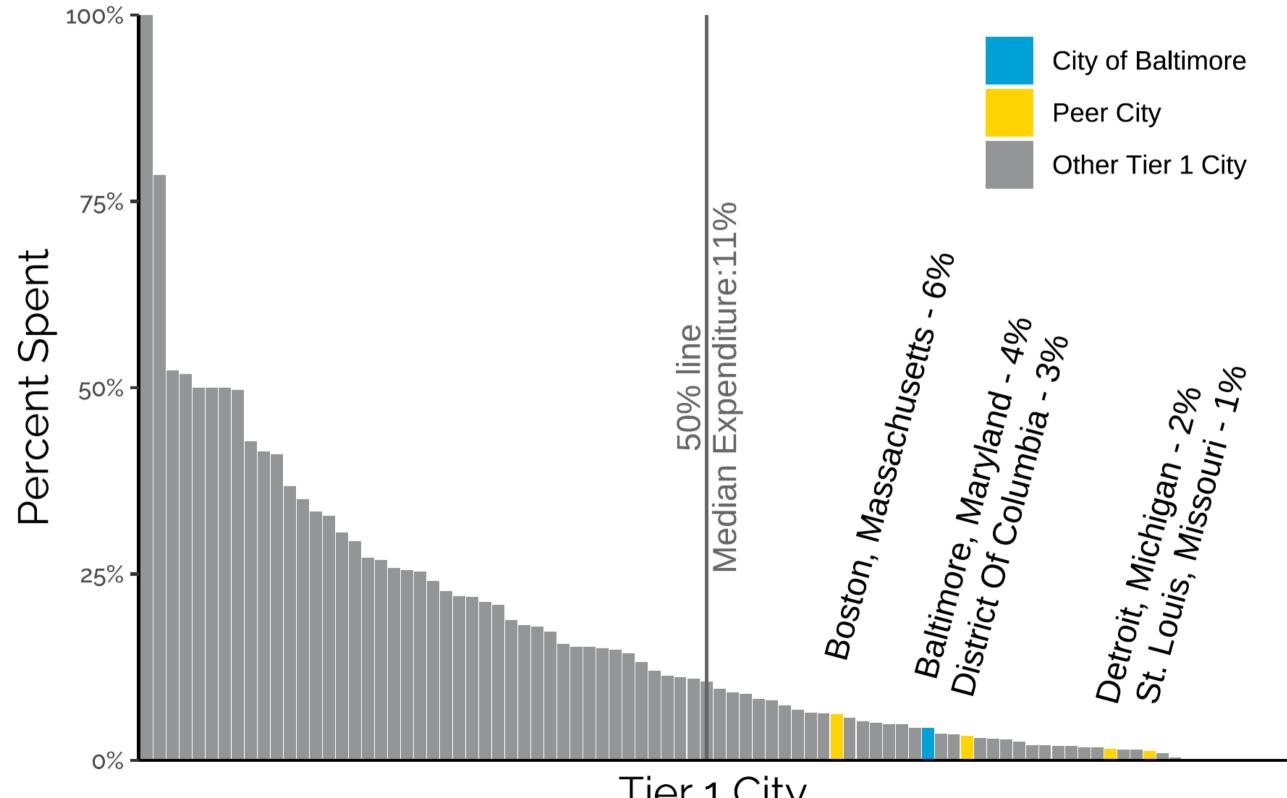




Tier 1 Cities Expenditures

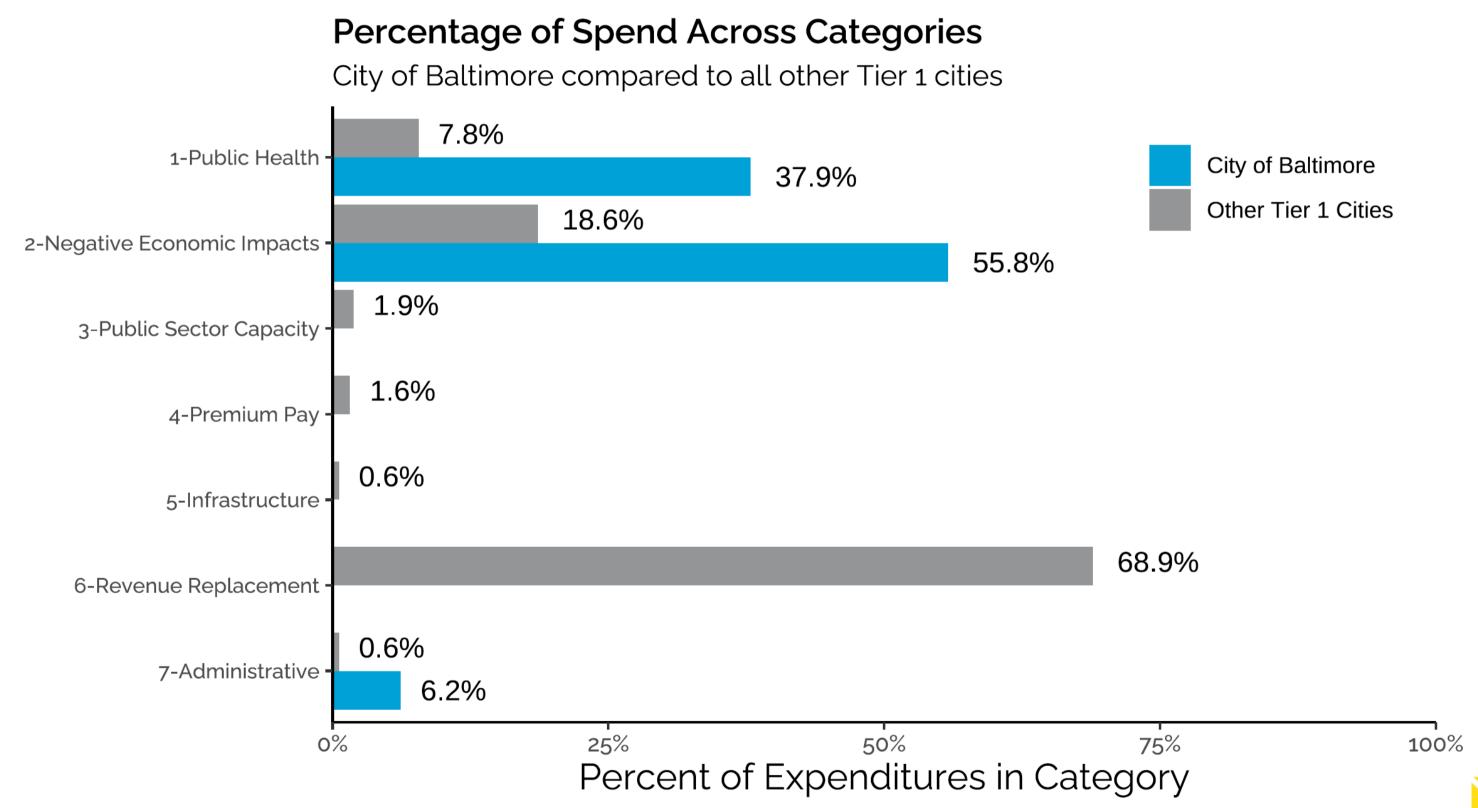
Percentage of Allocation Spent in Tier 1 Cities

Tier 1 Cities are those with over 250,000 residents



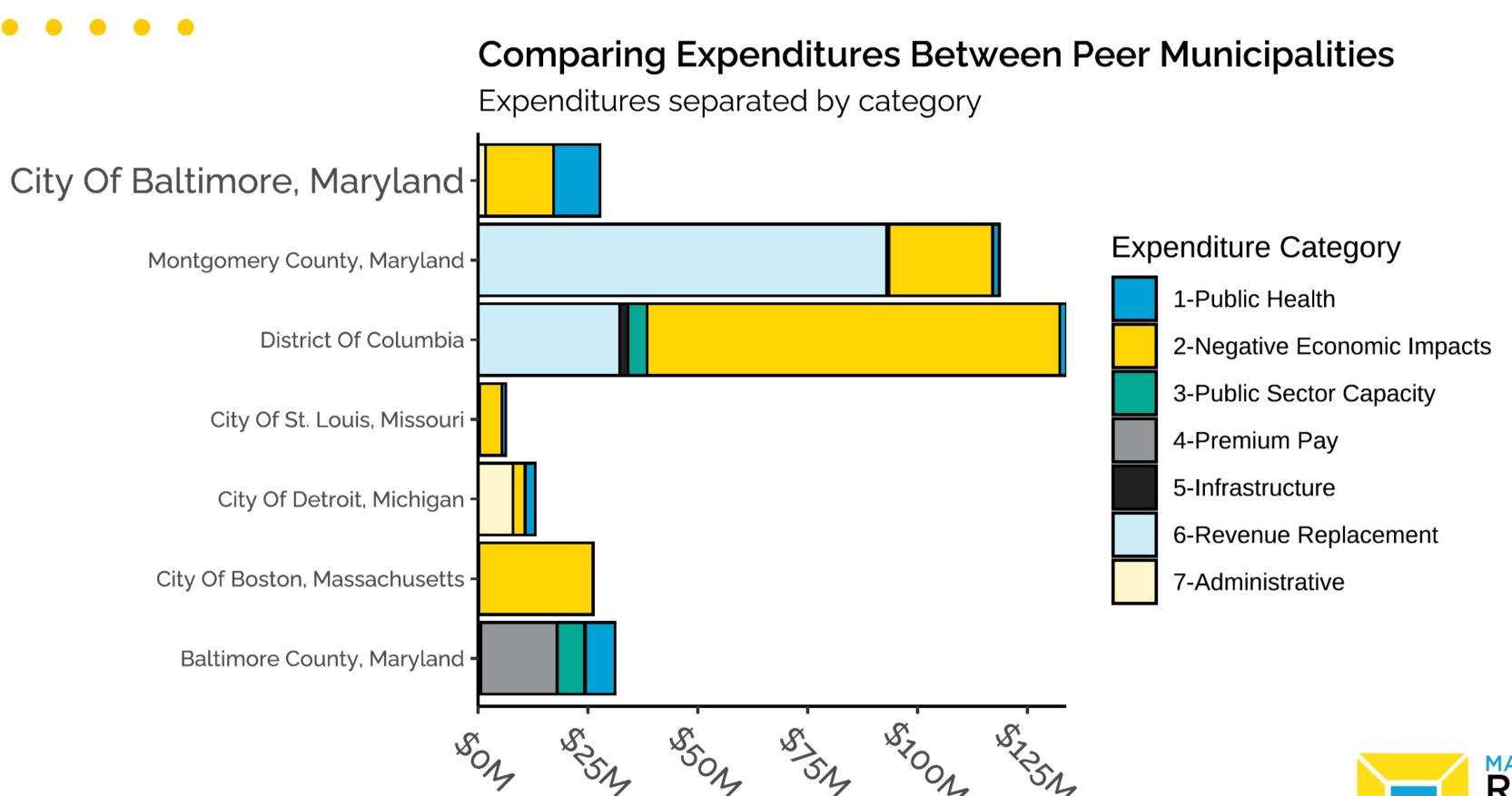


Tier 1 Cities Expenditures by Category

Key Takeaways

- Year 1 of ARPA has been a year focused on planning and beginning program implementation.
- Cities and municipalities across the country have been "slow to spend." Several articles by respected organizations note this fact...Baltimore City is **not** an anomaly.
- Baltimore City and other peer cities have obligated most of its funding for programs and services
 aligned with addressing negative economic impacts.
- Compared to other Tier 1 cities, Baltimore City has spent most of its funding on programs and services
 related to health and negative economic impacts.
- Over 70 percent of all Tier 1 cities have cumulatively spent allocated funding for revenue replacement.
- Because revenue replacement is mostly directed to salaries, personnel costs and some government services, this aids in the appearance that other cities are spending "faster."



Treasury Report Overview

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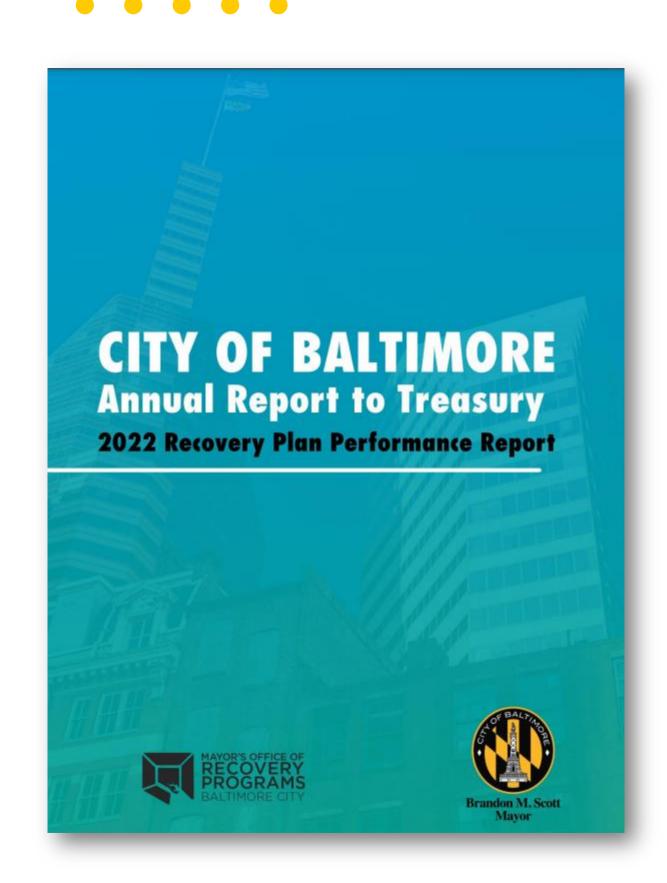


Key Points

- Period of performance covers April 1, 2022 June 30, 2022.
- The U.S. Department of Treasury does not factor in "commitments," only obligations and expenditures.
- Data are reported to Treasury by expenditure category and at specific time intervals (i.e., quarterly), therefore data may not align with information included in Council Reports or the public-facing dashboard.
- Many agencies are still fully designing and implementing programs, therefore performance data are limited. Additional data on required performance measures will be included in Treasury reports as programs are further implemented and data are available.

Treasury Report Requirements | Changes Since Last Report

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Project-specific measurements

For certain projects, new projects measurements were required. This included:

- Broadband and Digital Equity: Number of planned miles of fiber and number of places served, including community anchor institutions, residences, and housing units
- Workforce Development: Number of workers enrolled in sectoral job training programs, number of workers completing sectoral training, and number of people participating in summer youth employment programs

Written justifications

Written justifications are required for capital projects over \$10 million. Justifications submitted include:

New and Revised Data | Changes Since Last Report

- New projects: The City added two additional projects:
 - Improving Baltimore's Recreation Infrastructure
 - Increasing Economic Security through Guaranteed Income (Pilot Program)
- New expenditures: Two projects have expenditures in this reporting period that did not have expenditures in the previous Treasury report covering the date award through March 30, 2022.
 - Guaranteed Income Pilot Program
 - ARPA Project and Progress Evaluation
- Completed Payments: All committed funding has been disbursed to the following:
 - Economic Recovery Funding commitment has been disbursed to the five fiscal agents, totaling \$25M

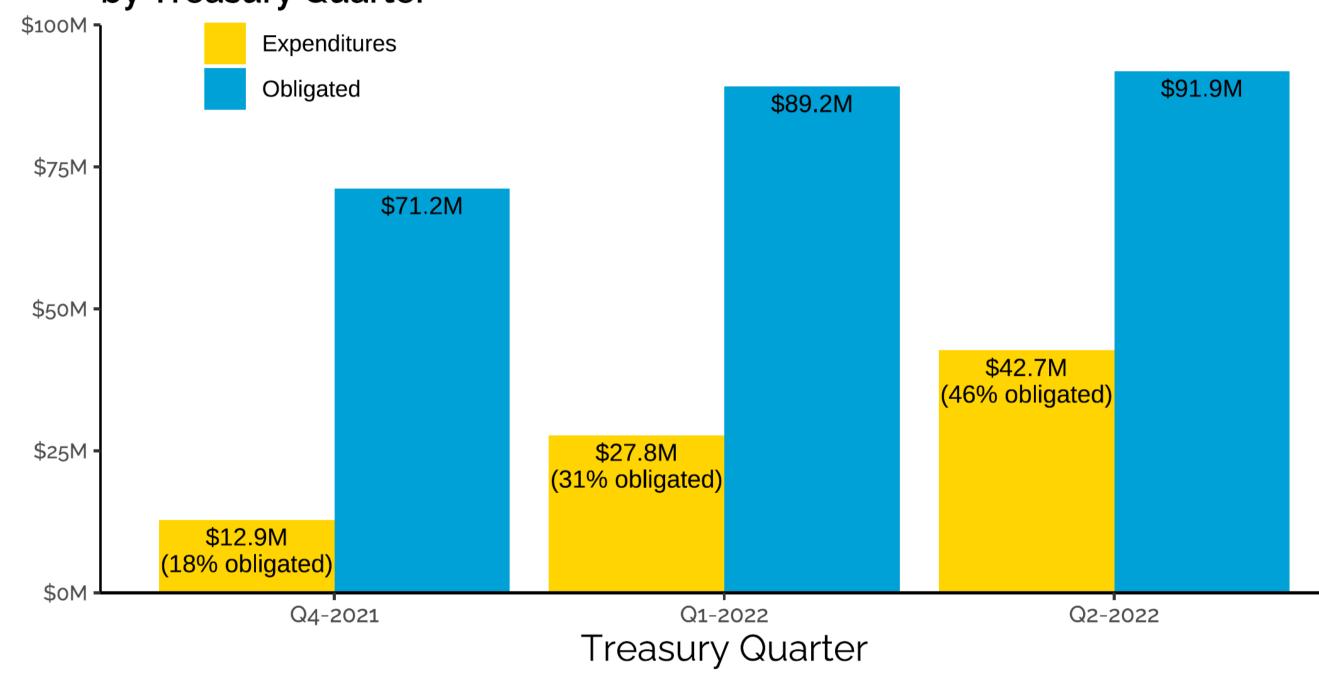
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Quarter-by-Quarter | Obligations and Expenditures

- For the period of performance, the City of Baltimore reported \$2,681,144.67 in new obligations and \$14,992,009.87 in new expenditures for 25 projects across 22 expenditure categories.
- Through June 2022, total expenditures increased to \$42,718,238 (46% of obligations)
- Compared to the April 2022
 Treasury report, obligations increased by 3% and reported expenditures increased by 54%.
