## **Major Issues Discussed**

- 1. Chairwoman Middleton opened the meeting, introduced committee members and City representatives and read the bill into the record.
- 2. Councilmember Stokes asked for an explanation of what is a snow melt system. He wanted the developer to explain the design plan for the system.
- 3. Liam Davis explained that Johns Hopkins has an active construction site on 1700 block of Monument Street. The plan is to install a snow melt system which would help prevent the ground from freezing. The annual franchise fee is \$70.30 annually for 25 years. The snow melt system is limited to the sidewalk in one area. Design plans for the system are handled by the City's Right of Way Division.
- 4. Ms. Seltzer provided public testimony and was interested in reviewing the design plan for the system. She also wanted more information about the cost of the system. She spoke about protecting the environment. She provided the committee with handouts.
- 5. The committee discussed the snow melt system. The committee expressed concerns about protection of children; activation of the system and control of the temperature; and outreach to the surrounding community.
- 6. Chris Lagana explained that the system is not electric, but is operated with the use of a fluid circulated in a tube beneath the ground. The system is not harmful and will be paid for by the hospital. The system reduces the use of salt on the street.
- 7. Agency representatives testified on behalf of their respective agencies.
- 8. The hearing was recessed to allow the developer to discuss the plan with the district councilmember.
