Budget Briefing – Bureau of Budget and Management Research (BBMR)

Purpose:

For the purpose of calling on the Director of the Finance Department's Bureau of Budget and Management Research (BBMR) to brief the City Council on how the City's actual finances compare to its budget projections.

Agencies/Organizations Reporting

Bureau of Budget & Management Research

Current Law

Baltimore City Code – Article 1, Subtitle 1-City Council, Sections 1-5 and 1-6

§ 1-5. Agencies to provide budget status reports.

(a) Reports required.

On or before November 1, February 1, May 1, and August 1 each year, the City agencies so requested shall file quarterly budget status reports with the Budget and Appropriations Committee of the City Council.

(b) Contents.

Each report shall contain the information required by the Committee and be in the format requested.

(c) Public hearing.

The Committee may hold a public hearing for those agencies not reporting or those showing a projected deficit for the fiscal year.

(d) "City agency" defined

The words "City agencies" include the City trustees and all City sponsored and financed nonprofit corporations. (City Code, 1976/83, art. 1, §5.) (Ord. 72-211; Ord. 77-333; Ord. 81-568; Ord. 82-753.)

§ 1-6. Agencies to provide legislative information.

It shall be the duty of the head of every City department or bureau established by the Baltimore City Charter or by ordinance to provide all technical materials, plats, drawings, and information that are requested by any member or the President of the City Council for the purpose of introducing legislation into the Council.

(City Code, 1976/83, art. 1, §6.) (Ord. 76-080.)

Background

On February 7, 2023, a representative(s) from the Bureau of Budget and Research Management came before the committee to discuss the <u>first quarter projection</u> for <u>this fiscal year (Fiscal Year 2023)</u>; <u>July 1, 2022</u>, <u>through September 30, 2022</u>. The representative also gave an update regarding where the Department stood for closing the books for Fiscal Year 2022 which ended June 30, 2022; Fiscal Year 2022 closeout had not been finalized as of the day of this hearing.

Major Issues Discussed

- 1. The representative from BBMR gave a PowerPoint presentation. However, just before giving the Presentation Mr. Cenname informed the committee that Closeout for Fiscal Year 2022 was not yet finalized. A copy of the Presentation is on file. The Presentation included the following:
 - The status of fiscal year 2022 (ended June 30, 2022)

 - Currently projecting a \$30.5 million surplus
 - Revenue is strong; but is steadily coming back to normalcy

 - Homeless Shelter Page 11 of Presentation
 - Why is homeless shelter cost still under the Health Department instead of under Homeless Shelter?
 - Vandalism/Vacant Buildings
 - This is of concern
 - Comment: We need to invest in cameras to address this issue
 - Affordable House Trust Fund
 - Requested by councilmember Ramos: Please submit the amount of revenue received for this fund

- Vacancies
 - How have inflation impacted wages and is there any additional costs to the City?
 - Wage Study:
 - Is there any data available for this study:
 - Response: Per Ms. Larsen Will gather the information on these types of studies and submit to committee.
