REQUESTS:

<u>City Council Bill #23-0389/ Transit-Oriented Development – Reisterstown Plaza</u>: For the purpose of supporting a State Transit-Oriented Development designation for Reisterstown Plaza, the area surrounding and including the Reisterstown Plaza Metro Subway Link Station; and providing for a special effective date.

City Council Bill #23-0390/ Transit-Oriented Development - Penn Station:

For the purpose of supporting a State Transit-Oriented Development designation for Penn Station, the area surrounding and including Baltimore Penn Station; and providing for a special effective date.

RECOMMENDATIONS: <u>City Council Bill #23-0389</u>: Approval <u>City Council Bill #23-0390</u>: Approval

PETITIONER: The Administration (Department of Transportation)

SITE/GENERAL AREA

<u>General Area</u>: These bills cover two areas. The first is around the Reisterstown Plaza Metro Subway Link Station, roughly between Wabash Avenue to Metro Drive, and from Northern Parkway to Patterson Avenue. The second includes a number of blocks surrounding Penn Station.

HISTORY

There are no previous legislative or Planning Commission actions regarding these actions.

CONFORMITY TO PLANS

These legislative actions are intended to conform to Title 7, Subtitle 1 of the State Transportation Article, which requires the State to obtain local jurisdiction support for Transit Oriented Design (TOD) projects by adoption of a local resolution. These bills are also compatible with the Consolidated Transportation Program, with emphasis on public transit and TOD, generally.

ANALYSIS

Attached to each bill is a letter from the Mayor outlining the priorities that are consistent with the administration's commitments to increase access to public transportation, advance the implementation of our innovative and comprehensive complete streets, ordinance, support the safe and reliable movement of freight, and connect City residents with major employers across the region. This program will help unlock funds needed by the City in order to maintain our transportation network in the state of good repair, and to meet public's needs.

High-Impact Priority Projects outlined include:

- Vietnam Veterans Memorial Bridge and Hanover Street multimodal corridor improvements.
- US 40 Franklin and Mulberry highway redevelopment and ramp removal.
- Implementation of the greenway trails
- Locally operated transit services.
- Transit Oriented Development.

Program City-wide initiatives with insufficient funding that will be aided include:

- Roadway resurfacing.
- Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliance.
- Traffic safety improvements.
- Transit flow and access improvements.
- New finance options and state support for bridge repair and replacement.

As this is consistent with our local priorities, and since it will aid in obtaining needed funds, staff recommends approval of both bills.
