**REQUEST:** <u>City Council Bill #23-0423/ City Property – Renaming Cottage Avenue Park to</u> <u>Candy Stripe Park</u>:

For the purpose of changing the name of Cottage Avenue Park, located at North East Side 30 Foot Alley 2nd South West of Cottage Avenue Rear 3700-36 Cottage Avenue (Block 3335, Lot 067), to Candy Stripe Park.

#### SITE/GENERAL AREA

<u>Site Conditions</u>: This park parcel is in the interior of the block bounded by Cottage Avenue on the east, Violet Avenue on the south, Park Heights Avenue on the west, and Springhill Avenue on the north. This park parcel measures approximately 295' by 78'4" (23,108 sqft / 0.53 acres).

<u>General Area</u>: This park is located in the Park Circle neighborhood, which is generally bounded by Druid Park Drive on the south, the Western Maryland Railroad line on the west, Springhill Avenue on the north, and Greenspring Avenue on the east, with Reisterstown Road and Park Heights Avenue bisecting the neighborhood. This neighborhood is predominantly residential in nature in the central portion of the neighborhood, with rowhomes and semi-detached homes comprising the majority of the residential stock. There are scattered institutional uses around the periphery, and some commercial uses along the major corridors.

## HISTORY

There are no previous legislative or Planning Commission actions regarding this site.

## ANALYSIS

<u>Background</u>: This name change recognizes a long-standing community practice of referring to this park as Candy Stripe Park. As captioned in the bill, Cottage Avenue Park developed this nickname by the neighborhood children identifying it by its metal dividers painted red and white. We understand that this has been a local tradition for over 40 years. A community member recently commented recently at the Park Heights Community Conversation meeting how "Candy Stripe" as a name is central to the community's shared identity.

Equity:

There are no obvious equity impacts as a result of this proposed change, nor will there be any particular impact to our Departmental operation.

Notification: Planning Staff notified the following organizations of this item: the Plantation Park Heights Urban Farm, the Park Heights Renaissance, the Springhill, Derby Manor, Keyworth, Greenspring Community Association, and the Pimlico Terrace Neighborhood Association as well as residents of Park Circle.
