ANALYSIS

The committee held a hearing on August 18, 2022, and a work session on January 12, 2022.

The resolution invites various City officials and agencies to appear before the City Council to discuss the plans and strategies that are being developed to transition Baltimore City employees back to safe physical work environments.

Baltimore City is in the process of restoring 100 percent of resident-facing services, which will require some City employees to return to work onsite. The Restoration of Services Oversight Committee (RSOC) is leading the process and is charged with reviewing agency plans for restoring services, including procedures for staff and resident safety and a staff notification process. It is currently unclear when the City will begin transitioning other employees back to onsite work.

The committee will reconvene on October 11, 2023. Attached are notes from the January 12th work session.

The Department of General Services (DGS) has been actively engaged in the activities of mitigating the impacts of COVID-19 in the workplace and keeping our employees in, and visitors to, City buildings safe and healthy.

DGS has participated in the creation of the Restoration of Services Oversight Committee (RSOC) whose role is to oversee and manage the activities related to the City's coordinated efforts to keep the workplace safe both within services that never ceased operations at the beginning of the pandemic, as well as those seeking to restore discontinued operations. The related activities undertaken by DGS, under the auspices of the RSOC and in adherence to The Centers for Disease Control (CDC), The American Institute of Architects (AIA), Baltimore City Health Department and The American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE) requirements and guidelines, are numerous.

As co-lead (along with the Mayor's Office of Emergency Management) of the RSOC's workstream for Facilities, Equipment and Logistics, DGS has been at the forefront of the City's engineered changes (e.g. installation of plexiglass, reconfiguration of work spaces to allow for distancing, etc.) required in City buildings.

DGS takes no position on Council Bill #21-0052R and defers to RSOC's response. DGS will be joining other member agencies represented within the RSOC in providing a joint briefing and presentation to this Committee on January 12th, 2022. We welcome the opportunity to stand in front of you and provide additional details as you may require.
