Major Issues Discussed

1. The DHCD affirmed its support and presented a comprehensive toolkit developed to address the needs of various stakeholders, including homeowners, homebuyers, renters, community organizations, and businesses.

2. The Director of Planning and Assistant Director of Planning discussed the history of the middle neighborhood strategy and presented criteria for selecting neighborhoods for targeted intervention. They also emphasized the importance of a path forward for sustainable community development.

3. The Department of Public Works expressed support for the resolution and provided information on its written report. They mentioned participation in a slide presentation and confirmed their

commitment to the goals outlined in the resolution.

4. Live Baltimore: The "Buy Back the Block" program was highlighted, focusing on converting tenants to homeowners through financial support for purchasing and renovating rental properties.

5. Acknowledgment that different neighborhoods face distinct challenges, requiring tailored

solutions.

6. Concerns about transit access disparities, with a focus on addressing transportation challenges in middle neighborhoods.

7. Discussion about the Sewage Overflow Program (SOS) and the challenges in providing support during wet and dry weather events.

8. Questions about outreach efforts to ensure residents benefit from the Homeowner Tax Credit and possible legislative support for removing asset caps.

9. Exploring opportunities to collaborate with universities and leverage anchor institutions to encourage residents, especially students, to live in middle neighborhoods.

10. Consideration of incentives for students, faculty, and staff to reside in these areas.
