# The Land Bank Authority is Duplicative of DHCD

## The Land Bank Authority is Duplicative of DHCD

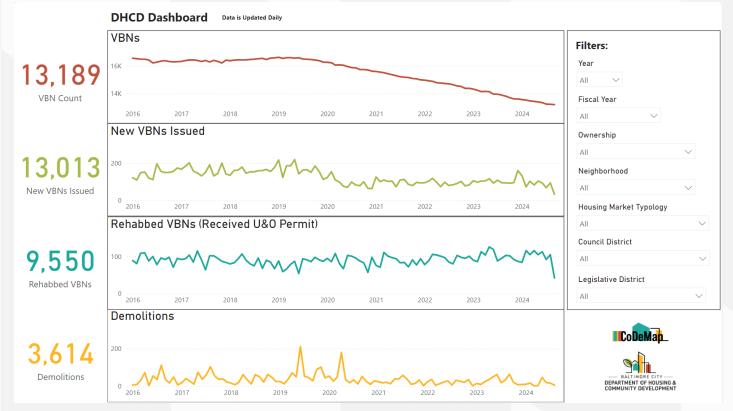
- 1. DHCD already utilizes all tools proposed for the Land Bank Authority
- 2. The Land Bank Authority does not have the State Authority to do In-Rem acquisition and other crucial functions needed for vacants elimination
- 3. There are considerable operational and capital costs to stand up this authority, which are not concretely identified nor outlined in any publicly available materials
- 4. The Land Bank Authority does not incorporate prevention work, critical to the elimination of vacants





# DHCD: Already Addressing the Vacants Crisis

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City of Baltimore Leads with Place-Based Housing Interventions Conclusion Abandoned housing has been an issue in Baltimore since the 1970s which has burdened residents and been costly to the city in lost tax revenues. The city has historically targeted the issue with innovative yet incremental policies to varying degrees of success. 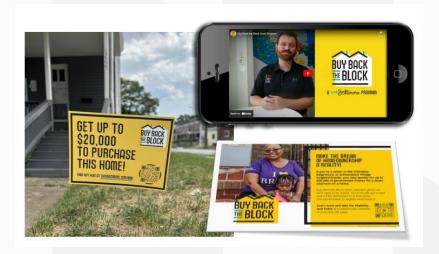


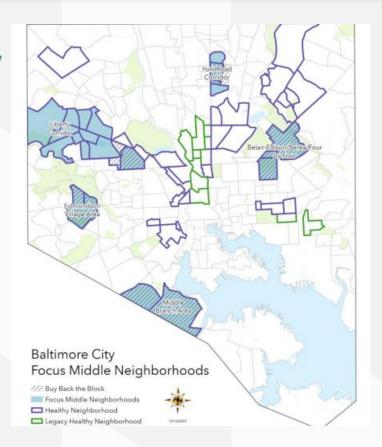

Fixed Pricing Program



The BuyIntoBmore Fixed Pricing Program is a sales program for specific City-owned vacant buildings and lots! The program is being implemented in the following phases:

Phase One (April 1 - July 1) - Prioritized for Baltimore City residents committing to restoring and living in the home as a primary residence.

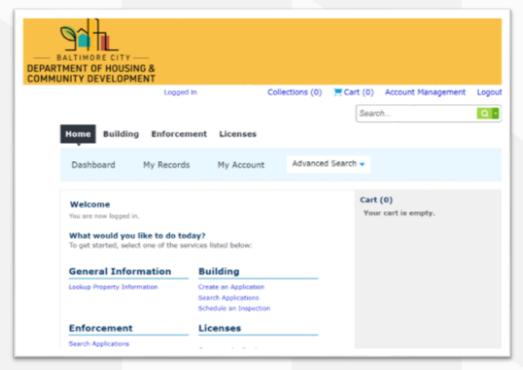
Phase Two (beginning April 15) - Identifies properties not yet owned by the City where applicants have a legacy or familial interest.

Phase Three (beginning July 1) - Includes future homeowners, community land trusts, non-profit and for-profit developers.



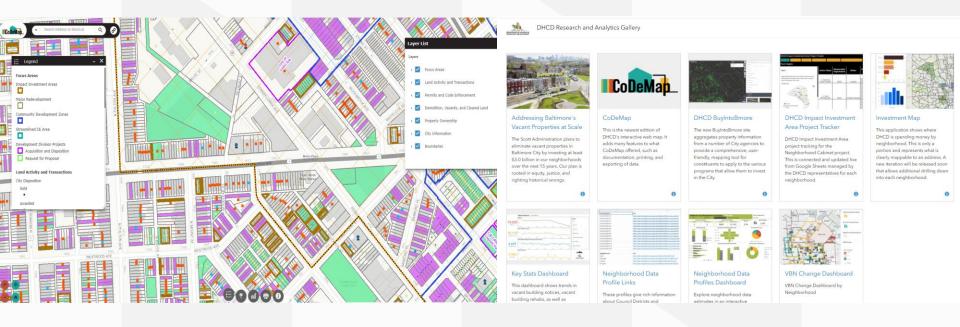
